IN MEMORIAM

MRS. (MAJOR) EWEN MACDOUGALL
The funeral of the late Mrs. (Major) Ewen MacDougall took place yesterday afternoon from the home No. 89 Upper Prince Street to the People's Cemetery. Services at the house were conducted by Reverend Bruce Muir of St. James Church, and Rev. Hammond Johnson of the United Church.
