For the second time in the game the City squad took the lead when Dewar Larter scored his first of three goals but again Nationals came roaring back two minutes later to again draw up on even terms. But before the session had ended Larter shot two more counters to give the Heartbreakers their margin at the end.

All through the third session Nationals pressed continually but the best they could do was fire one goal past the sensational Jordan to tie Heartbreakers emerge the winners by a one-goal margin.

Habs Swamp Toronto Maple Leafs By 8-2

MONTRÉAL, Feb. 6—(CP)—Rolling up a 7-0 count in the first two periods, Montreal Canadiens swamped Toronto Maple Leafs 8-2 here tonight before a crowd of 12,341 and took a commanding five-point lead over their rivals in the National Hockey League race.

Canadiens smothered Leafs 4-0 in the opening period and ran up a commanding lead that was never threatened in a rough and bruising game that saw 18 penalties handed out, nine going to the hard-checking Canadiens who kept Leafs on the defensive throughout.

Though they won the game Canadiens suffered a possible grave loss when star centre Elmer Lach collided with Don Metz early in the first period and suffered a possible concussion. He had to be helped from the ice and was still unconscious as the game ended.

The Montrealers opened up early, just after Lach was injured, when Murph Chamberlain slapped Maurice Richard's rebound at the five-minute mark. Glen Harmon slapped one through a maze of players from the blue line, and Richard and Leo (Gazelle) Gravelle added a pair more before the period ended.

Big defenceman Butch Bouchard, centre Bill Reay and Buddy O'Connor scored in the second as Leafs stayed behind the eight ball.

Tempers frayed and play got rougher in the third which featured three free-for-alls, and 10-minute misconduct penalties to Gus Morton of Leafs and Kenny Messell of Canadiens in the last 10 minutes.

Leafs came out with blood in their eye and Bill Ezinicki finally counted for them, slapping Teeter Kennedy's pass behind Durman at the 3:02 mark. Twenty-one seconds later, Toe Blake rapped in Richard's pass and Syl Apps wound it up at 14:32 with Toronto's second goal and the last of the night.

Morton and Messell drew their misconducts after Bouchard and Little Bud Poile were chased for roughing and a fight broke out in Leaf territory. Another scramble started back of Durman, but was quelled when Beardon was chased for piling in on top of Don Metz.

Kensington Wins From Borden 9-2

On a perfect sheet of ice on Tuesday evening, Feb. 4, the Kensington Granites playing before upwards of five hundred avid fans, took the measure of the Borden Nationals to the tune of 9 to 2.

The game was lightning fast and exceptionally clean, both teams paying strict attention to hockey. The Kensington team look better on each appearance and when the MacNaught trophy is handed over, will not be mere spectators.

The first period saw play seething from one end of the rink to the other with both goalies making some brilliant stops. At the ten minute mark F. MacKay scored on a relay pass from the Glydon brothers from about 25 feet. Toey Richard hit the goal post with a scorcher. The Woodside brothers and Cameron eased right in on the Borden net but Macdoles rose to dizzy heights stopping Cameron's shot from the crease. H. Champion brought the fans to their feet with a beautiful rink-end rush but was stopped by MacKay. Period ended Granites 1, Nationals 0.

The second period was only two minutes old when G. Woodside finished the light on a pass from C. Woodside. The Nationals came back strong and the old warrior C. Howatt, ever dangerous around the cage, sank one behind Matthews at the eight minute mark on a relay pass from the Davraich brothers. Cameron of the Granites matched this goal at 16 minutes on a pass from C. Woodside. One minute later C. Woodside scored from Cameron.

The third period saw the Nationals' defence unable to cope with the smooth passing attacks of the Granites, while their own defencemen played brilliantly. The period was 4 minutes old when G. Woodside scored from C. Woodside. Three minutes later, C. Champion made his own goal, but MacKay at the 8-minute mark Cameron scored from a passing play with the Woodside brothers. Four minutes later MacAler made a brilliant stop off C. Woodside but G. Woodside sank the rebound.

With but one-half minute to go C. Champion got the final goal on a pass from F. MacKay.
