WHAT TO EAT TO BE HEALTHY
 NUMBER FIVE
 MINERALS

No less than twelve minerals are required for an adequate diet, but from a practical standpoint we need only be concerned with a supply of three of them, because if our diet is at all a reasonable one, it will contain adequate amounts of the other nine. The three minerals that we must watch are:

Calcium, the lack of which causes brittle bones and teeth.
 Iron, the lack of which causes anaemia.
 Iodine, the lack of which causes calcium, too.

There is a constant storage and use of calcium in the bones, and a person may appear in the best of health, yet his bones may not contain as much calcium as they should. In time, this deficiency will interfere with the health. For example, a pregnant woman is likely to suffer from tooth decay because there is a tremendous drain on her calcium resources. If she does not have an adequate amount in her diet, nature takes it out of her bones and teeth.

Our greatest sources of calcium are milk and milk products. To get an adequate supply, adults should consume each day, those to a pint who is forming new bones should take a pint and a half of milk. Cheese is an excellent source of calcium, too.

Iron is obtained largely from vegetables and fruits. Other sources are eggs, liver and kidney. Iodine is obtained largely in sea foods. People who live remote from the sea have to depend largely upon iodized salt for their source of mineral food.

The following foods give you minerals:
 Milk and cheese, eggs, liver and kidney, leafy vegetables such as celery, lettuce and cabbage, also fruits and iodized salt, and cheese for calcium; eggs, liver, kidney, vegetables and fruits for iron; and iodized salt for iodine.

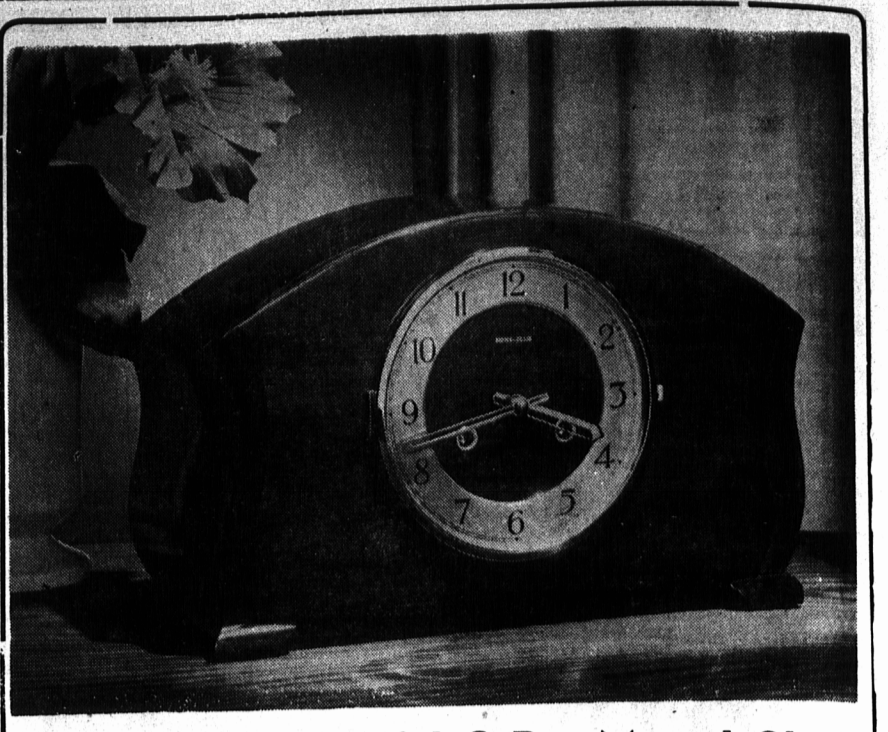

SHIFT GOVERNORS AS CRISIS FIXED

NEW DELHI, April 26—Governors of both the United Provinces and Bihar have been granted four months' leave, it is announced. This follows the political crisis caused by resignations of Congress party ministers in the United Provinces, Bihar and Sind. The resignations were withdrawn after an understanding had been reached regarding release of political prisoners.

Sir Maurice Hallett, governor of Bihar, is to act as governor of the United Provinces during the absence of Sir Harry Bag who has been granted four months' leave from May 18. Sir Thomas Stewart, a member of the governor-general's Council, will act as governor of Bihar during the absence of Sir Maurice.

H. Garret, at present a commissioner in Bombay, will act as governor of Sind during the absence of Sir Lancelot Graham who has been granted four months' leave from June 15.

BRITISH GUNS FOR U. S. FORT

TICONDEROGA, N. Y., April 26—The British government has presented a battery of six 18th century long nine-pounder cannons to Fort Ticonderoga in memory of British soldiers who fought and died in the Lake Champlain region during the revolutionary war. The guns bear the cipher of George III, with the crown, and the broad arrow of the British army. They have a long and unusual history. After service for many years they were discarded for newer types. For a while they were grouped round the Napoleon III monument at Woolwich, England. Later the statue was moved to the spot where Napoleon III is buried, and the guns were stored in a magazine. A few months ago General Gochen, commanding officer at the British War Office, had the guns presented to Fort Ticonderoga. That suggestion was acted upon favorably and the guns were shipped to the United States.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., April 26—The liner "Lady Nelson" Canadian National Steamships, Captain T. R. Coffin, arrived at this port today with passengers returning from a round voyage to the Leeward and Windward Islands, Barbados, Trinidad, and British Guiana, via Boston and Bermuda.
