Bill Boyd In "Burning Gold" At The Capitol

Bill Boyd crashes through with another virile characterization in "Burning Gold," the picture now being presented at the Capitol Theatre with Bill in the heroic role of a courageous, two fisted battler on the side of justice and a square deal. Plenty of swiftly-moving drama, spectacular action in flame-swept oil fields, and a human interest story that is unflinchingly absorbing combine to make "Burning Gold" a feature of genuine entertainment.

As Jim Thurston, Boyd presents a convincing characterization. Defeated in his efforts to win a bonus he accepts a proposal to sink a well on speculation. In a desperate effort to ruin him, a rival orders his well dynamited. The plot acts as a boomerang; an ocean of black oil gushes forth, bringing a million to Boyd.

Particularly noteworthy are the spectacular oil well scenes, first when the oil rushes in, and again when the well as a mass of thick smoke and flame. Boyd's fistie encounter with his hated rival spared neither contestant and was roundly applauded. Judith Allen makes an attractive figure as Jim's patient and devoted wife. Lloyd Ingraham, Fern Emmett and Frank Mayo are prominent in the cast.

Warner Baxter In "Prisoner Of Shark Island" At Prince Edward

Is fact stranger than fiction? With the production of "The Prisoner of Shark Island," now at the Prince Edward Theatre, the screen again proves that the raw material of life outstrips the talented imaginings of playwrights for pure drama.

Telling the true story of Dr. Samuel Alexander Mudd, the man who was unjustly imprisoned as one of the Lincoln conspirators, the new picture is an amazing document of man's inhumanity to man.
