The Association have asked in a respectable manner that their recommendations for positions be acted upon when possible, but up to the present their efforts have not been without avail. The idea of the Association now is to hold a meeting in public meeting in Charlottetown to find out the public think the returned men are being fairly dealt with. It was also stated at the meeting that a new Janitor is shortly to be appointed for the Provincial Building, and that it now looks as if the chances of getting a returned man in this position are very doubtful. This case will be watched with interest by the Association.

Through this political coup, which was first forecast some weeks ago, when it became apparent that Sinn Feiners were planning to go out after voters in a smashing campaign organization, it is said it plans to paralyze British power.

**A CORRECTION.**—Last week this column appeared in error under heading "Veterinary Column" edited by Mr. McKinnon. We may say that Comrade McKinnon is not responsible for what may appear in this column.

**TAX EXEMPTION.**—At the regular meeting of the G. W. V. A last Friday night it was moved that a vote of thanks be sent to local Government for legislation passed exempting soldiers from taxation. The Secretary then pointed out that the thanks of the Association had already been sent to the Premier. The exemptions in brief are as follows:—Clause 13. Exempts from taxation the income of every soldier, sailor or nurse who served Overseas during the war up to and including One thousand Dollars for a period of five years from passing of the Act. Clause 23. Exempts from taxation the pension of every officer, soldier, sailor or nurse who served Overseas, also the pensions of widows and orphans of Overseas men. Clause 24. Exempts from taxation the real and personal estate of every officer, soldier, sailor and nurse, who served Overseas up to the value of One thousand Dollars, and the income on said real and personal property. Clause 143. Exempts from poll tax all those who served in any Military or Naval capacity Overseas or while on duty in Canada.

**BASEBALL.**—The Veterans went down to defeat in their last game with the Abbies by a narrow margin, but cheerily, it was a splendid game. The Veterans team has done splendid work, this being their first reverse, they are now however consolidating their position, and no doubt before long we shall see them going over the top again and bringing fresh laurels to their colours.

**WHAT FRANCE GAVE.**—What is, perhaps, the first concise and comprehensive statement of France's war losses has just been made by Captain Andre Tardieu, in describing what he calls the "balance sheet" of France. Capt. Tardieu states that during the five years of war was eight million men were mobilized, of whom 1,400,000 were killed, 800,000 maimed and 300,000 wounded. France thus lost 57 per cent of her men under 32 years of age. Concerning material losses, he stated that 600,000 houses destroyed, 75,000,000 acres of arable land laid waste and 3,000 miles of railroad and 25,000 miles of highways destroyed. Mines which produced 55 per cent of France's total coal output were damaged or destroyed; 11,500 factories, which before the war produced 95 per cent of the woolen goods, 90 per cent of the linen material, 70 per cent of the sugar, and 60 per cent of the cotton goods, were crippled. One third of France's ships were sunk by German submarines. To defray the cost of munitions of war and food supplies, France had to raise more than eight billion francs, of which sum she was forced to lend 1,320,000,000 to foreign countries.

**EXAMINATION OF THE WITNESS.** Little of importance was elicited. Mrs. Yeo stated that just before the prisoner left for Summerside in the custody of Constable Bradley he bid his mother good-bye.

Subsequently the witness went over to the Ellis home with the prisoner, William Yeo accompanied them. He had no conversation with the prisoner whatever on the way.

Ramsay stated that at the house Corbett Ellis said: "I don't think there is any use going upstairs until the doctor comes"—or words to that effect. They sat down in the kitchen. Nothing more was said. After a short time the witness went home, returning later, Dr. Stewart had then arrived. He went upstairs and from the door of the deceased's room he saw the body. He illustrated the position of the body as he saw it. Witness said that the chin was against the leg of the table just under the ledge. Mrs. Yeo opened the razors, and scissors and also the necktie. There were some books and toilet articles. About half way between the body and the door was a chamber. On the bed there was a looking-glass. The pillow was at the head of the bed. It was covered with blood. There seemed quite a lot of blood in the bed.

After going from the door the witness again went into the mother's room. Mrs. Charles Ramsay was there then. The latter, as far as Mrs. Yeo knew, never went into the deceased's room.

When the coroner had given permission for the burial of the body Mrs. Yeo went to the deceased's room at the request of the mother to look for some clothing with which to dress the body. It was lying on the bed exposed from the waist upwards.

Mrs. Yeo said she noticed a calendar on the table at that time. It was standing supported by a back piece near the wall.
