I., leaves the city tonight for Montreal en route to England. Mr. Bowness will meet G. W. Barrell, president of the power company in the city, and they will go on to New York, and then to London. The purpose of the visit is to consult with the head office of Sir John Jackson Limited, regarding the power scheme. Mr. Bowness states that on his return some time in May, the work on the railway end of the project from Edmonton to Blue Rapids will be commenced immediately. Mrs. Bowness will spend the summer months with her husband's people in the Garden Province.

The funeral cortege left the house in the following order: Firing Squad (in charge of Sergt. The funeral was one of the largest ever seen in Summerside the streets being lined with people from Water Street to the Church.
