Something New

"RCMP FILE 1365 is something new in motion pictures. Never before has an actual Canadian murder case been filmed, the story of the RCMP been told in such detail, the Mounties themselves performed before a motion picture camera for a production destined for the screens of Canadian Theatres and to go abroad afterwards to tell the world of the renowned Force. Various locations were used in the filming. The Justice Building at Ottawa, national Headquarters of the Force was the scene of several days shooting. The RCMP Barracks at Rockcliffe was used extensively. Ottawa Restaurants, a boarding house, a street corner in Hull and a street scene in Smiths Falls appeared in the film.

It was winter when the NFB production crew commenced to shoot the Courtroom scenes. The Westerners don't mind the cold. Prominent legal men offered their services. Townspeople rallied to the call for "extras". All were to meet in the Courthouse on a certain day, which dawned in the worst blizzard in the history of the City, which was buried, actually interred, under drifts of snow 30 feet deep in places. The RCMP barracks on the outskirts and many places within the City limits were cut off by the storm.

But right on time the cast arrived at the snow-buried Courthouse. The Chief Justice of the Court, The Agent of the Attorney General, the Sheriff, Lawyers, Court officials and a number of townspeople appeared as scheduled and remained as long as the filming operations required them.

Huge Lights Used

Lighting the extensive Halifax dock area by night was a challenge to the NFB electricians. Using huge lights they managed to illuminate speeding harbour craft sufficiently for the purpose and surprisingly good footage was produced. But the weather tossed its usual wrench into the machinery. It was so cold along the Halifax waterfront then that sound cameras refused to operate properly so most of the sound in the dock sequence was recorded "wild" (not in synchronization with the visuals) and dubbed in later.

The script of RCMP-FILE 1365 was written by NFB's Don Mulholland from actual RCMP reports on a real murder case. Mulholland also directed, produced and edited the production. Ron Weyman was assistant director, Lorne Batchelor headed the camera unit and Joseph Champagne and Clifford Griffin the sound crew.

The NFB featurette "RCMP-FILE 1365" will be showing at a local theatre during the latter part of the present week.
