DEHYDRATION PLANT NOT TO OPEN—Mr. L. R. Allen, Secretary of Island Foods Inc., said yesterday that in his opinion the dehydration plant at Summerside would not operate this year as they have no orders of sufficient size to warrant it. They have a few orders, he said, but they are only for small quantities. He explained further, that if a contract were received, provided that materials such as coal and cans could be obtained, it would take about two weeks to get into operation. It is understood that many farmers and potato dealers throughout the province are anxious to have this plant open if at all possible due to the extraordinarily large crop and the difficulty of getting the potatoes shipped before the frost sets in. There is a danger of many potatoes being lost due to the lack of proper storage and the shortage of railway cars for transportation. The suggestion has been made that the dehydration plant at Summerside might be used for the manufacture of glucose in the plant at Hartland, N. B., which was destroyed by fire last week. When asked about this suggestion, Mr. Allen, said he had no information he could give out on the matter.—S
