—FUNERAL SERVICES.—The funeral of the late Mr. John Squarebriggs who passed away on Saturday night at his home in Miscouche, took place on Wednesday afternoon under the auspices of Mount Lebanon Lodge A. —KENSINGTON SCHOOL CONVENTION.—An ideal entertainment was given in the C. M. B. A. Hall on Monday night by the pupils and teachers of Kensington High School. The spacious hall was just able comfortably to accommodate the audience attracted by the magnetic power that a Kensington school concert always exercises. Mayor Bentley happily presided. The training necessary to develop the program as rendered, entailed much additional work and the teachers certainly deserve all the praise that has been showered upon them. The development of the faculty to entertain assists in the strengthening of the power to understand, hence school concerts have an educational effect. Moreover happy memories are often enthroned around the association of these events in school. The purpose of the concert was to raise funds to build a sidewalk from Central St. to the High School in memory of the boys from this centre that fell in defense of the Empire.
