Gunder Haegg Wins From Gil Dodds In Mile Race

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18 (AP)—Gunder Haegg of Sweden, world's greatest long distance foot-racer, failed in his attempt yesterday to run the fastest mile in history, but ably demonstrated to 15,000 spectators at Kezar Stadium why he holds most of the records from 1,500 to 5,000 metres.

Haegg clocked off the mile in four minutes, 12.6 seconds showing the way to America's 1,500-meter champion Gil Dodds of Boston, and winning as he pleased. He set his own pace, moved into the lead after the third lap and raced home waving his hands to the crowd.

His long hair streaming in the breeze, the swift Swede seemed at once to lead in the final 200 yards.

Haegg's time was slow compared with his own best mile race of 4:04.6, a time which was bettered by two seconds a few days ago in Sweden by his countryman, Arne Anderson.

Haegg's chances of establishing a new record for one mile were handicapped somewhat by lack of opposition.

Dodds was an active contender for the first two laps. He sprinted into the lead shortly after the start and maintained a two-yard advantage for the first 380 yards. Haegg started moving up slowly and after a third of the third lap had been passed, Gunder took command.

Everything Went "Poof" Italian Says

LONDON, July 15 — (CP Cable) — A bulky 55-year-old Italian General, Achille D'Avet, sat in the wardrobe of an allied destroyer in the Mediterranean and said: "Suddenly, everything went poof."

It was his classic description of the Canadian landings on Sicily, on the beaches and headlands which his 206th coastal division was supposed to defend, and did defend in a desultory sort of way until, finally, he and his whole staff surrendered to the Canucks at Modica, 15 miles northwest of Palermo.

This story of D'Avet, who was decorated in the last war by the Duke of Connaught, former Governor-General of Canada, with the Military Cross, has been pieced together from cabled reports by Ross Munro, Canadian Press War Correspondent with the Canadians in Sicily, and Noel Monks, a correspondent for the London Daily Mail.

Munro was at Canadian headquarters in southeast Sicily when the Italian General was brought in a prisoner. Monks interviewed him later aboard the allied destroyer when his main purpose seemed to be to convince everyone that "I fight lika da gentleman."
