TERROR MOUNTAIN

MISS HAIG TELLS OF CONFERENCE

WINNIPEG, Man. Oct. 2—If the woman of the Women's Canadian club were not afflicted with the itching foot before they heard the address of two of Winnipeg's distinguished travellers they all went home with that ailment. For whether it was with "lilies of the field," under direction of Miss Hennette Haig who attended the Imperial Press conference, in London; or with Mrs. R. F. McWilliams who was an advisory delegate to the conference to the tailors and spinners of the Labor convention at Geneva, all listeners were ready to take the road wherever the guide would lead.

Miss Haig spoke of kings and diamonds.

At Buckingham they were received by the King on whose countenance

IS DELIGHTED WITH QUALITY OF P. E. I. SPUDS

Prominent Rhode Island Dealer Purchases Steamer Load On Visit Here.

Surprise at the advanced development of agriculture in this Province, as well as the facilities for looking after the different products grown by the farmers, was expressed by Mr. A. M. Tourtelot, of Providence, R. I., representative of the A. M. Tourtelot fruit and produce dealers, a long established firm which has each year purchased and sold a large quantity of Prince Edward Island potatoes. Mr. Tourtelot stated that never before in his experience had he viewed potatoes of quality equally as good as here.

During his brief stay, Mr. Frank B. Clarke of Clarke Bros., Charlottetown drove the visitor through some of the principal potato sections, and they viewed behind the digger and in the bins this year's yield of potatoes.

Mr. Tourtelot hopes to return again another year, planning to spend a longer time in the Province.

Of special interest was his announcement that he had purchased from Clarke Bros., a large steamer load of table stock Green Mountains to be shipped early in November.

Comparing the Prince Edward Island crop with crops in Maine, Long Island and Rhode Island, Mr. Tourtelot remarked that it would be of interest to the farmers in these sections to come over here, and actually see how carefully these potatoes are handled during digging season, and what scientific farmers we have in this little Island, compared with the numerous other larger potato growing sections in the United States and Canada.

More than 150 persons attended Wednesday night's district meeting in the \$250,000 Prince Edward Island Hospital campaign at Orange Hall, Bradairene. Mr. W. J. Seaman presided.

Dr. R. F. Seaman, the speaker of the evening, delivered an illustrated address on the importance of building the new Hospital immediately. He sketched the progress of the Hospital since its foundation in 1883, and showed by charts how greatly the public demand on its service has exceeded its capacity for the past several years.

A speech supplementing Dr. Seaman's information was made by Mr. W. K. Rogers, Chairman of the Memorial Committee, who has been a member of the Board since 1904 and its Chairman since 1917.

Senator John E. Sinclair, in a stirring address, said he agreed with the Charlottetown speakers that the new Hospital is an imperative necessity and should be constructed without delay. He expressed the belief that the people of Bradairene would do their full part towards subscribing the \$250,000 fund.

An interesting musical program was provided by Mr. Albert Blanchard and his orchestra, consisting of Mr. Alfred McKeane, violinist; Mr. William Fitzgerald, saxophone; Mr. Thomas McFarlane, trumpet, and Mr. Aloys Arsenault, banjo. Several excellent solos were sung by Mr. George Beer. Mr. William McEachern played several solos on the harmonica.
