

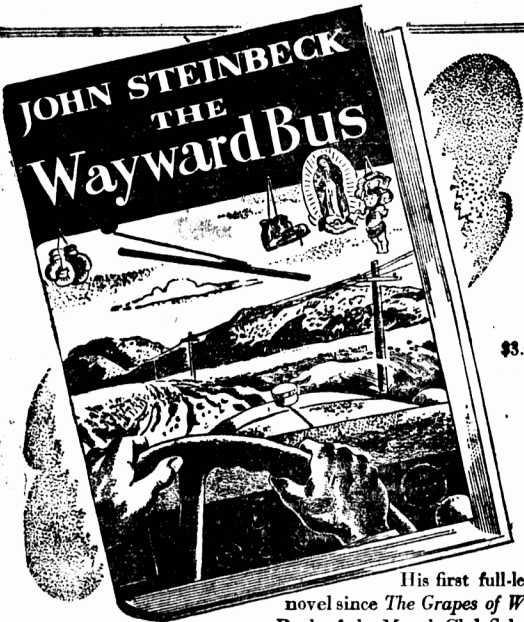

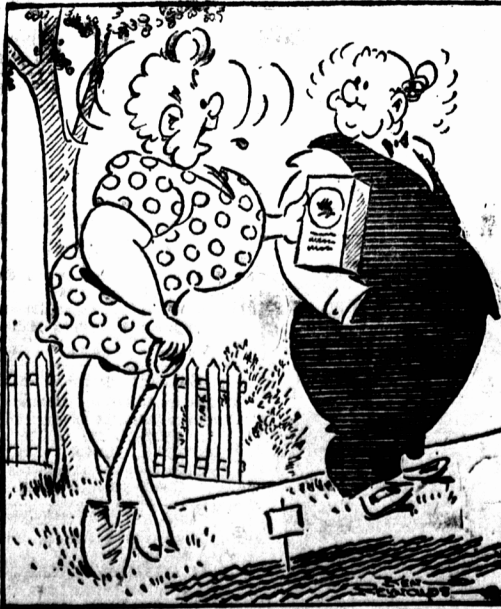

MISS MARY ELIZA WADE

There passed to her rest in this city on Tuesday, January 28th, of this year after an illness of seven months, a very gracious lady in the person of Mary Eliza Wade.

The late Miss Wade was born at Charlottetown on Wednesday, July 7th, 1866, the daughter of Robert Wade, of Waterford, Ireland, and Mary Ann Cole of this city.

The mother of these children, Mrs. Robert Wade, was sister to Hon. George Coles, three Premier of Prince Edward Island, and one of the Fathers of Confederation.

Miss Wade was, throughout her life, a staunch member and a constant attendant of St. Paul's Anglican Church in this city.

She is survived by the following nieces and nephews: Mrs. Flora Smith, Mapleville, Rhode Island; Mr. Robert Wade, Boston, Mass.; Mr. William Wade, Ridgeway, New Jersey; Mrs. Robert McKinney (nee Carol Wade), Clayton, Missouri; Mrs. Bruce Marr (nee Grace Messervy), Elmira, Ontario, and Mr. Harold Messervy of this city.

Of these, the writer is one. He was her nephew, and she was his aunt. He was with her in her 89th year when she died, she was always young and gay in mind and spirit.

Commends Work of Queen's Co. Mail Carriers

The following is from Hansard reports of the House of Commons debates, Feb. 20, on motion for second reading of a bill respecting supplemental payments on mail contracts:

"Mr. W. Chester S. McLaure (Queens): Mr. Speaker, I have been listening for some time to the remarks made by members from all the different provinces and, lest you and the Postmaster General (Mr. Bertrand) might consider that the mail carriers in my constituency of Queens are perfectly satisfied with their present remuneration, I think it is my duty to say a few words on their behalf.

"The mail carriers in our province are the finest citizens that we have. They are carrying on responsible work, and they have to do this work 310 days out of the year. They are granted two days holiday. Yet all these men are underpaid.

"In supporting the resolution and this bill, let me say that I consider that the bill is a means of legalizing the bonuses which have been paid and which are to be paid. But why should we legalize them on the basis of the vast difference between the contracts that now exist? When the bonuses were granted a year or two ago the department must have estimated them on some cost basis and, as far as I can find out in my constituency they were basing the cost at around \$40 a mile.

"We have seventy-eight mail contracts in the constituency of Queens, and of those seventy-eight fewer than ten per cent have received the bonus.

"The rate per mile on the different contracts in the constituency of Queens varies from \$18 a mile up to \$40, some at \$35, a few at \$74 and one, I think at \$110. I take no objection to even the highest rate, for it is not too high. What I am objecting to is the lack of uniformity throughout the whole constituency.

"Let me give a few illustrations of the discriminations that are caused by the present method of tendering. In different places two men tendered on different contracts covering a distance of 8 1/2 miles. I know the routes perfectly well and the conditions are very same in both. Yet one man gets \$47 a mile, while the other man is doing his work in the very same constituency for \$35 a mile.

"In two other places that I noted by the list, the route to be covered is 18 1/2 miles, covered by horse and cutter in the winter. In the summer, if they can get the luxury of a car they do so. One man gets \$90 and the other receives \$80.

"I have seen another case where two men have practically the same distance to cover. One man covers 2 1/2 miles and the other 2 1/2 miles gets \$850, while the man with the 2 1/2-mile route gets \$1,550.

Hon. Mr. Bertrand (Laurier): "Would the hon. gentleman give the names and numbers of these routes. The I shall have the details by tomorrow morning."

Mr. McLaure: "I shall give them to the Postmaster General when I have finished. The \$1,550 route works out only \$5 a day. After all, surely, with a horse and buggy in the summer and a horse and cutter in the winter the man and the horse are worth \$5 a day for carrying His Majesty's mail. I am taking objection only to the discrimination between these different contracts. If we can have uniformity of remuneration among these contracts—and I hope the Postmaster General will be lenient in that respect before the houses at an early date—then all our mail carriers will be more or less satisfied."
