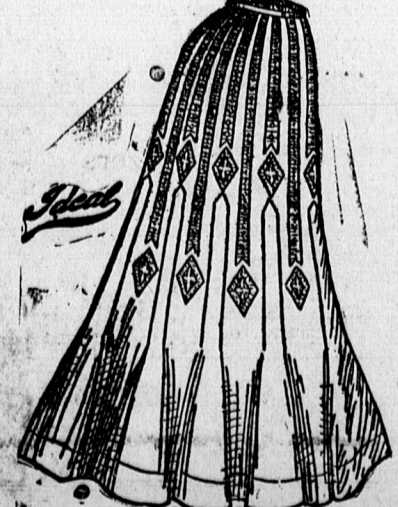

MOROCCAN MINES.

LONDON, July 26.—The Daily Express this morning publishes a curious story to the effect that six Englishmen led by James Ashmead Bartlett, representing a British syndicate, have penetrated Morocco and obtained from Mulai Hafid, the usurping sultan, the promise of valuable mining railroad and trading concessions in return for assistance in establishing Hafid on the Moroccan throne. The story is extremely improbable, Bartlett having been at Fez as the correspondent of a London newspaper.
