Centenarian Princess Dies

Buck Jones As "Mountie" In "Border Brigands" At Capitol

It is seldom that an outdoor adventure picture is so filled with powerfully dramatic situations as is "Border Brigands," the Universal picture which opened an engagement at the Capitol Theatre yesterday, with Buck Jones in the starring role.

The story concerns the activities of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police under the Arctic Circle, where American and Canadian territories join. Jones is a lieutenant in the isolated post of the red-coats, and a leader in carrying on a bitter fight against a band of cutthroats with headquarters in settlements on the American side of the line. His natural enmity turns into cold hatred when his brother, a private in the ranks of the "Mounties," is slain when he surprises the bandits in a robbery.

Joe E. Brown In "Bright Lights" At The Prince Edward

Joe E. Brown came to town yesterday in his latest comedy romance, "Bright Lights," a First National picture, filled with mirth and melody, as the feature attraction at the Prince Edward Theatre.

Good Work by Flying Doctor

In the far north-west, where the only roads are rough bush tracks along which it would take many days, and in some cases weeks, to bring a patient to the nearest hospital, the speedy service of the flying doctor has saved many lives.

Typical of his work is Dr. Clyde Fenton's recent flight to attend four miners who had been injured by a fall of rock in the shaft of the mine in which they were working.

Word of the accident reached Dr. Fenton at night and he set off immediately, taking off from an improvised aerodrome in pitch darkness. Owing to the surrounding country being dense scrub, Dr. Fenton could not land at the mine, where the accident occurred, but aided by the headlights of motor cars, he landed in a paddock of a cattle station about 15 miles distant. He travelled to the mine in a car and attended to the injured men, and then made arrangements to convey the most seriously injured of them to Darwin hospital.

The man's condition was such that it was impossible to carry him in a truck to the plane, and so 40 men set to work to clear a level piece of ground about five miles from the mine. Trees were grubbed out and a runway was cut 200 yards long and just wide enough for a plane to land. Dr. Fenton succeeded in landing his plane safely and six men carried the injured man five miles through the bush on a stretcher, the doctor taking his turn with the others.

After being given an anaesthetic, the patient was lifted into the plane which took off without mishap, and a little more than an hour later the injured man was safely in Darwin hospital.

Balloons' Long Ride

Recently a 10-ton motor lorry of the six-wheeled type was used to convey 21 balloons from a cattle station in the south-west of Queensland to Broken Hill in New South Wales, a distance of about 750 miles, or approximately equal to the distance from London to Edinburgh and back. At Broken Hill the cattle were placed in cattle trucks and taken by rail to the stock market at Adelaide, this section of their journey being equal to that between London and Edinburgh.

To get the cattle to the market it was necessary to use this means of transport, as owing to the dry conditions prevailing in the southwestern portion of Queensland, it was not possible to move the cattle by the usual method of driving, if the venture proves successful, more cattle will be sent by this means.

Queensland's Sugar Harvest

The statement made by the Chancellor of the Exchequer (Mr. Neville Chamberlain) that no change would be made in the existing preference for Dominion sugar without 18 months' notice first being given to the Dominions, had had a very reassuring effect on the Queensland sugar industry.

Queensland's crop of sugar cane for the 1935 season is now estimated at 4,190,000 tons, which should yield 360,000 tons of sugar, compared with 611,727 tons produced last year. The figures for 1935 must be regarded as a maximum, and the actual output, therefore, will be substantially less than that of the 1934 season, thus resulting in a smaller exportable surplus being available. OATMEAL COOKIES WITH DATE FILLING

Cream 1 cup shortening and 1 cup brown sugar together, and add 3 cups rolled oats. Mix and sift in 2 cups of flour, 1 teaspoon soda and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Enough milk to make stiff enough to roll. Let stand overnight and bake in the morning.

Date Filling: Out up fine 1 cup (or required amount) of dates. Cover with water and add brown sugar to taste; boil until thick. Fill cookies as required, as the filling makes them soft.

Many Sharks Along Queensland Coast

A school of between 40 and 50 sharks, measuring from 12 to 15 feet in length, attracted a big crowd of Southport, Brisbane's most popular seaside resort, where for more than three hours the sharks were close in to the shore as they pursued shoals of blue sprat which were migrating to northern waters.

Several of the sharks became temporarily stranded when they ventured too close to the shore in pursuit of their prey. Three members of the Southport Life-saving Club succeeded in grabbing a 12 foot tiger shark by the tail as it lay stranded in about 18 inches of water, but they released their hold when it lashed its tail vio-
