R. pen 2, led the contest for the week with 42 eggs, 40.8 points; Mrs. J. F. Easton's W. L. pen 16 were second with 38 eggs, 36.3 points; Mr. A. L. Rogers, Kensington, B. R. pen 3 were third with 36 eggs 32.5 points. The Kensington Baby Chick Hatchery, B. R. hen 9 in pen 2, leads the contest for individual laying with 33 eggs, 32.3 points. Mr. James Tuplin, B. R. hen 9 is second with 30 eggs, 31 points; The Experimental Station, B. R. hen 8 in pen 5, is third with 34 eggs, 27.6 points. The pens leading in total production are: 1st, Ken. B. C. Hatchery, P. E. I., B. R. Pen 2, 168 eggs, 157.4 points. 2nd, William Sansom, Durham, N. B., B. R. Pen 10, 147 eggs, 132.6 points. 3rd, Mrs. J. F. Easton, New Wiltshire, P. E. I., W. L., 136 eggs, 122.4 points. IN MEMORIAM

MRS. CHARLES GORMAN Though not entirely unexpected, the news of the death on Saturday, Dec. 7th, of Mary, the beloved wife of Mr. Charles Gorman, of Gleggery Lot 7, came as a great shock to the entire community.

The deceased had been enjoying good health since early in July, when she was stricken by neuritis, but it was not generally considered that her condition had reached such a serious stage. During her illness she received the best medical skill procurable and was attended by every kindness and comfort that a kind husband and sister could provide. In August she entered the Prince County Hospital, where she remained for some time in hopes of gaining her former good health, but no treatment could stay the hand of death, which had marked her as its victim.

Her death bed scene was a tranquil one. Her soul being fortified by all the rites of Catholic religion, administered by her ever attentive pastor, the Rev. J. A. McDonald, passed peacefully away to its Creator, assisted by the prayers of those loved ones present.

Mrs. Gorman was a daughter of the late Paul and Mrs. Gallant, Locke Road, and leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband, four brothers, viz., Peter, Michael and John, residing in the United States and Stephen at home, three sisters, Mrs. Daniel McCormac and Matilda in Boston, Mass., and Annie, who waited on her during her last illness. To those most sincere sympathy is extended.

The deceased was a woman of wise temperament and sound judgment, displaying a maturely quiet disposition, which rejected any impression of conceit. Such characteristics made her very popular with her associates, especially in the various activities of the Catholic Women's League and the Ladies' Auxiliary in which she was a member and a willing worker, encouraging those who were less fortunate in possessing such an optimistic nature.

No place probably did she fulfill her task more acceptably than in the home circle, where she led, not in the way of harshness, but in kindness, and where her genial smile of welcome will ever be remembered by those who visited her. In life, a devout Roman Catholic
