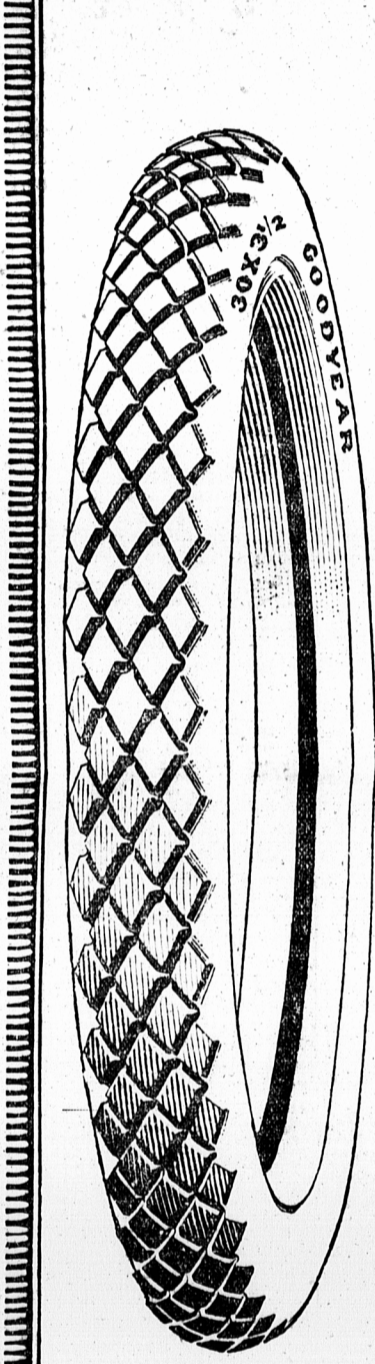
OTTAWA, May 22—The Spinney bill, amending the Civil Service Act, went through the special committee yesterday. It is understood that amendments have been made in the draft bill as it was sent to the committee, and that the bill as amended will provide for certain classes of appointments being removed from the operation of the Civil Service Act, and will give the Civil Service Commission power on consultation with Deputy Ministers and approval by the Governor-in-Council, to add to the list of these classes as it finds necessary in the public interest.

COAL CONTRACTS AWARDED

It has been announced from Ottawa during the past week that coal has been purchased by the Canadian National Railways, and that contracts have been distributed among the different Nova Scotia coal mines in approximately the following quantities: Maritime Coal Co., 100,000 tons; Intercolonial Coal Co., 100,000 tons; Acadia Coal Co., 150,000 tons; Greenwood Coal Co., 50,000 tons; Inverness Coal Co., 60,000 tons; Bras D'Ore Coal Co., 60,000 tons; Dominion Coal Co., (from its Cape Breton and Springhill mines) 60,000 tons. Prices range from \$6 to \$6.35 net ton f.o.b. cars or steamers.

THE OLD GARDENER SAYS

Many people spoil their early flowering shrubs by pruning them at the wrong time. All the shrubs that flower in the spring should be trimmed immediately after the blooming season if at all, because during the summer they form new buds, which will be removed if cut. Pruning is done in the fall or late winter. It is a foolish practice to merely snip off the ends of the shrubs. The proper way to prune them is to cut out the old canes close to the ground, so that the new canes will have a chance to develop.

COULDN'T KEEP UP WITH HIS WIFE'S CHANGES IN FAITH SEEKS DIVORCE.

NEW YORK, May 21—His wife's too frequent changes of religion and faith were the final cause that impelled him to ask the court to dissolve their marriage, according to the petition for divorce from Mrs. Edith MacDonough of Burke's, Mansion, Ridgewood, which was read before vice chancellor Griffin in Jersey City before Lawyer John J. Walsh for Charles W. MacDonough, Manhattan, N. Y., a silk merchant.

The MacDonoughs were Episcopalians when they were married at Manchester Vt., Nov. 22 1893, the petitioner says. Ten years ago his wife began changing her religion with her clothes and she persistently harassed the petitioner because he refused to change with her. First she was a Spiritist and then in succession she was a follower of these religions and cults: Economites; Mesmerists, Mind Readers and Fortune Tellers; Christian Scientists; Theosophists; New Thought; Angel Dancers and Numerologists.

There was nothing in our home at that time, the petitioner says, but theorizing on dogmatic subjects and problems, and she denounced him in vile and abusive language for his refusal to co-operate with her in her religious changes, and the home became a pandemonium. In December 1920 his wife sent their daughter to his office with the message, I have at last found the true religion numerology and a request for \$100 to pay for instruction by a lady teacher in numerology. He sent the \$100. Soon afterward his wife told him through the true religion numerology, she had learned by the study of mystical and symbolic numbers she had got the wrong man for a husband. We were never intended for each other, she said. You

Because of her hatred and cruelty he had become a nervous wreck and because of violent temper and abuse in Dec. last he was obliged to leave her.

He was unable to attend to his business when he left her and he now felt it would be improper and unsafe for him to live with his wife again. His wife has changed her name from Edith to Ruane and their daughter Marian has changed her name to Rexano.

Their children are; Marian 24 years old; Mabel 20 and Margaret 17 years.

He has given his wife all of his \$2500 income in recent years and also gave her 450 acres of land at Camotau, N. H. and property at Ridgewood worth \$12000 but they sold that and he gave her the cash. His wife, he says squandered \$7500 and he sold securities for \$5000 and gave her the money to keep her in a rank and station to which she was not accustomed before their marriage.

Is it worth the price? The wife's answer denies the cruelty and the religious changes except that they were Congregationalists and became Episcopalians. It was at her husband's suggestion she said, that she took up the study of the science of numbers with the purpose of using it in earning money. She denies hatred of her husband.
