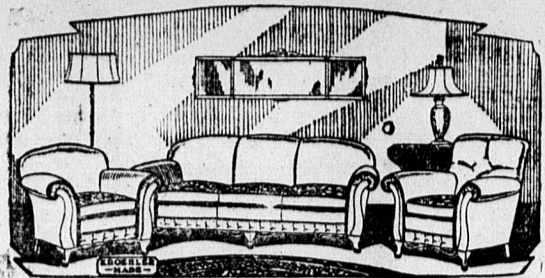

REPORT OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY OF THE Y. M. C. A. FOR THE MONTH OF JAN.

Gentlemen:

The following report is just a brief summary of the main activities for January. We are pleased to report that in general, things have been up to the usual standard. Activities in all departments have been well attended, and the usual winter program has been kept in full swing.

Boys Work: The usual program of building activities such as regular gymnasium classes, bowling tournaments, checker games, ping-pong, moving pictures, social outings, etc. Several of our outings to the toboggan slide had to be cancelled during the stormy weather. Skating and school hockey interest is growing stronger each week. The members are more fully realizing their allegiance to the Y. M. C. A. and in boosting their Y's Men's Club, they are boosting the Y. M. C. A.

Student Work: The students are using our building more than ever, and they are also joining in the general activities to a greater extent. Especially are they more interested now in their basketball leagues. Their usual Saturday night socials are still being held in Heartz Hall, but their special events are being held in the Y. M. C. A., as well as their cabinet committee meetings.

Hi-Y Club: This group comprising of our high school boys and college boys, participate in an all round program. They meet each Friday night for supper, sing-song, educational talks, and business.

They have a monthly social or supper, at which they entertain their lady friends, and also go out frequently to the toboggan slide. The club also has its hockey and basketball teams, and attend their gymnasium class session two or three times a week. This group has twenty-three or twenty-four members, and the average attendance for the month was seventeen. As several new members were brought in recently, their attendance is numbering up to twenty-one and twenty-two. Altogether the Hi-Y Club is a distinct success, and as time goes on, they will become of greater help to the Young Men's Christian Association. As it is now, many of them are acting as Junior leaders and assisting in the Physical Department program.

Y's Men's Club: Our Senior Service Club is growing stronger each week. The members are more fully realizing their allegiance to the Y. M. C. A. and in boosting their Y's Men's Club, they are boosting the Y. M. C. A.

This group, besides meeting each Thursday night for supper and program, have a bowling league of their own, participate with the Y's Menettes in their league. They also have a volleyball class on each Monday night, and a hockey team who are skating fans. The Y's Men have an hour at the Forum each Tuesday night. For a Service Club, their efforts are part of the Y. M. C. A., and they help wherever they can.

Four regular meetings and several executive meetings were held during Jan. Regular attendance at the supper meetings average around thirty. At the present time the Y's Men's Club are sponsoring a feature picture "A Rich Man's Polly" which is being shown at the Prince Edward Theatre, Feb. 29th, to March 2nd. The Club seeks the hearty co-operation of the Directors and every Y. M. C. A. member.

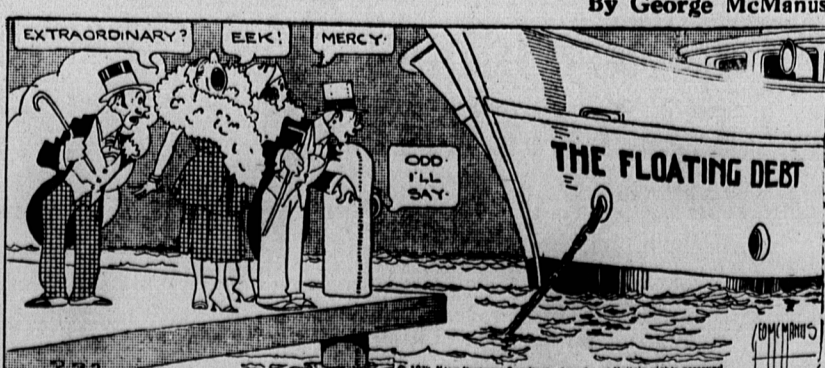
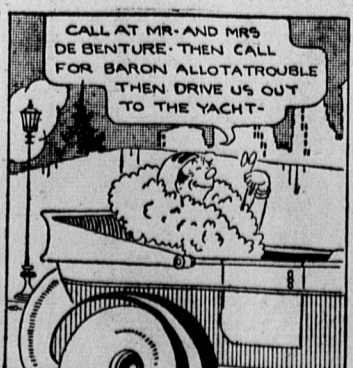
Girls Work: The usual number of girls classes are being instructed each week, with attendance

Bowling: At the present time we have six leagues in operation, and a few other groups who come once a week. The leagues are as follows: Rebekah, Commercial, C. N. R., Y's Men's, Y's Menettes, and Zion Guild. We have room now for three or four more leagues and in the near future, we may be able to have several more in operation. We are glad to report that during the month the mid-winter refinishing was accomplished without loss of time, and we were able to keep all leagues going at the time. This was one of the major tasks of the month, and it took your staff almost two months to complete it.

Finances: During January a special effort was made by the Finance Committee to clear up as many of our outstanding pledges as possible. It was a difficult matter, and not very much headway was made. Another special effort should be made as soon as possible. In this respect letters have gone out to many of those having unpaid pledges for 1931, paying the way for a personal call from some of the Directors. If a real earnest effort is made, we may be able to close our books this year without adding to our overdraft.

In closing, with the end of our fiscal year only ten weeks distant, we have serious cause for real earnest thinking, especially for the close of this year's business, as well as considering our 1932 May Financial Campaign, the set us and help which we may need. If we set ourselves to the task, seeking God's help, we can still come through successfully.

N. C. Brown Plans Long Distance Flight

NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 20—His plans shrouded in secrecy, N. C. Brown, former United States army flier painted an anti-freezing substance on the wings of his giant plane last night. He placed the ship in the hangar at Floyd Bennett field for the night refusing to give any information as to when or for where he would hop off.

It was reported at the field that Brown probably would take off tomorrow for Orford, Me. He would prepare there for a flight on which it is believed he hopes to break the long distance record of Boardman and Poland, set when they flew to Istanbul last summer.

It was reported, he planned either to head from Old Orchard for South America or across the Atlantic Ocean.

The South American view was advanced by the Newark ledger in a copyright story. It gives Buenos Aires as his destination.

Politics And War Concern Japanese

TOKYO, Feb. 20—(A.P.)—Japan's voters went to the polls to settle domestic politics today while government leaders pondered the need of sending still more troops to Shanghai to enforce their ultimatum.

The Seiyukai (government) party was expected to emerge victorious over the Minseito (opposition) party in a campaign fought chiefly on the inflation issue. Both parties support in the main the state's military policy and the result is unlikely to affect the course of the Sino-Japanese conflict.

Premier Inukai called on Emperor Hirohito last night and was understood to have submitted grave decisions for his approval. His move came after an important cabinet meeting at which Minister of War Araki warned that Marshal Chiang Kai-Shek was reported to be leading heavy reinforcements into the Shanghai lines in defiance of the Japanese demands.

Quebec Legislature

QUEBEC, Que., Feb. 20—(By The Canadian Press)—Notable for its increases in taxation and its lengthy debate on the St. Lawrence Waterways the first session of the 18th legislature of the Province of Quebec was prorogued today with a brief speech by Hon. H. G. Carroll, Lieutenant Governor. Hon. Mr. Carroll gave royal assent to a long list of bills, which included upward revision of taxes on gasoline, corporations, railways, meals, amusements and bottled liquor.

To Lecture On Problems Of India

HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 20—(By The Canadian Press)—In gradually teaching 350,000,000 people to settle down to Democratic forms of Government after centuries of official rule, the British nation is tackling a task unprecedented in history, S'r Henry Lawrence, K. C. S. I., distinguished former administrator of various territories in India, declared last night when he arrived on board the liner Montclare to lecture in Canada on the history and problems of India.

"India is entitled to enjoy home rule, but only when she is able to govern herself and that time is far distant. The Round Table Conference has accomplished a great deal in improving public opinion among the Indian masses, but patience is still the virtue most needed by all parties concerned in any discussions and conferences held.

S'r Henry pictured England as the impartial arbitrator between the two great religious bodies, Moslems and Hindus, receiving brickbats from both sides. The struggle between Moslems and Hindus for control and influence in various territories was bound to be bitter for a long time to come, but sporadic disturbances, with no general uprisings, were anticipated. He did not think the Indian army or police would be deflected from British allegiance.

S'r Henry will give addresses on India at Wolfville Monday, Halifax Tuesday, Seakville Thursday and Fredericton Friday, leaving then for Montreal.

JAPANESE WOMEN TO PRACTISE LAW
TOKIO, Feb. 20—Women lawyers in Japan will come into their own this year. New regulations affecting the Bar, with an amendment extending to women the right to practice law, will become effective on July 1. Women who have graduated from law colleges and passed the Bar examinations will be allowed the titles of probationary attorneys and may become attorneys after eighteen months' apprenticeship in a recognized law office.

Several hundred women will be graduated from law schools in the spring. The new regulations also cover the activities of more than

400,000 lawyers, who have practised for long as "Daigen." These must pass the Bar examinations within five years after July 1 or cease their work.
