ORPHANAGE STRIKE—An unpleasant situation arose yesterday morning at the Protestant Orphanage when three members of the staff "walked out" upon the Trustees, after refusal to comply with their demands, made only on the previous evening, for increased pay and for the dismissal of Miss Dunbar, the Lady Superintendent. Thought taken by surprise at the sudden "strike" the Trustees Board accepted the challenge and expect, with the assistance of the Ladies Auxiliary, to fill the vacant places almost immediately. In any case, none of those who left will be taken back. The striking members of the staff are the assistant superintendent the seamstress and the laundress. No legitimate grounds for complaint exist against Miss Dunbar, it is claimed by the Trustees. They are very well satisfied with the capable and efficient manner in which the Orphanage is being managed.

HONEYMOON OVER
DOORN, Holland, Mar. 13—The relations between former Emperor William and his wife, Princess Hermine, are strained, according to information obtained from a member of the one-time Emperor's entourage. This fact supposedly is the cause for the imminent departure of Hermine and her children for Silesia.

ENFORCE DECREE
LONDON, Mar. 13—The London County Council has decided to enforce its resolution that only women teachers who have no husbands shall be employed in the London schools.

OTTAWA, Mar. 13—Henry Ford will appear before the House Committee of banking and commerce to testify as an expert on the functions of Canadian credit. Other witnesses are Major Douglas, Esq., and H. S. Ross, Montreal; and George Boyington, Edmonton.

CHICAGO, Mar. 13—Fifty
persons lost their lives in a great storm which swept the country from the Rocky Mountains to the Appalachian Range Sunday night and early yesterday. Scores were injured and the property damage is expected to run into the millions.

Six Republicans Were Executed
(Special to The Guardian.)
DUBLIN, Mar. 13—Six Republicans were executed by Free State forces, three at Cork, and three at Dublin. They were convicted for having arms in their possession.

British Exhibition Opens April 1924
LONDON, Mar. 13—The British Empire exhibition will open April 19th, 1924 and close October 24th, 1924, so Viscount Womersley, secretary to the Board of Trade stated in the House of Commons today.

Britain Not to Build Dollar Fund in Canada

LONDON, Mar. 13—The British government does not look favorably upon a plan which has been suggested for building up a dollar reserve fund in Canada for the purpose of meeting interest payments on Great Britain's debt to the United States. This was intimated in the House of Commons today by Capt. Henry King, junior lord of the treasury, who declared it was the opinion of the chancellor of the exchequer that the only possible way for Great Britain to meet her U. S. debts was to provide liquid resources in the United States.

His statement was in answer to a question whether, in order to assist in payment of the U. S. debt the chancellor "will consider the desirability of building up in Canada a dollar reserve fund and so not only ensure the development of that country's resources but also with a view to annually supplying dollars for interest on our debt comparatively free from exchange fluctuations."

Capt. King said it would be impossible at the same time to use money to repay the United States and to develop Canada.

Genaro Banned by Commissions of Two States

NEW YORK, Mar. 13—Frank Genaro, who captured the United States flyweight championship from Pancho Villa last week, has found none too smooth his path as a titleholder. The disreputable East Sider, following disappointment of the fact that Villa, instead of himself, had been selected for a world's flyweight title bout with Jimmy White, of England, heard today that he was again under suspension by both the New York and New Jersey state boxing boards.

According to Louis J. Messano, chairman of the New Jersey commission, Genaro's suspension, due to his failure to go through with a match with Villa in Newark last December, was lifted only temporarily for the title bout in Madison Square Garden.

The suspension, however, went automatically into effect after the title contest and will not be lifted until Genaro boxes in New Jersey.

Budget Probably Before Easter

(Special to The Guardian.)
OTTAWA, Mar. 13—Good progress has been made in the consideration of the estimate of the departments and it was intimated by a member of the government tonight that the budget would probably be brought down just previous to adjournment for the Easter recess. There is little really contentious matter on the programme for the remainder of the month, most of the time consuming business being relegated to the three special committees on redistribution, bank act revision, and civil service reform.

NEW YORK POLICE WORRIED OVER JEWELRY ROBBERIES

NEW YORK, Mar. 13—A series of jewelry robberies totaling several hundred thousand dollars within the last 20 days has caused New York insurance companies to assign special detective agencies to make investigations.

A \$20,000 loss on Saturday, of which the police were notified late yesterday, and a hold-up of a jewelry salesman in a taxicab this morning, in which \$15,000 worth of gems were taken, are the latest cases the private agencies are working on.

NEW YORK, March 13.—Ireland has joined the Davis Cup quest for the first time. A formal challenge from the Irish Lawn Tennis Association was received today by the United States Lawn Tennis Association, together with a request that its team be drawn for play in the European zone of competition.

MONTREAL, March 13.—Suzanne Lenglen made her first appearance in the tournament here today and won her first four world champion by winning four straight sets in the singles, without losing a game. She defeated Mrs. Woodhouse in the second round match and Miss Stephenson in the third round.

Animal Act Effective April 1

(Special to The Guardian.)
LONDON, Mar. 13—At question time in the House of Commons today Sir Robert Sanders, Minister of Agriculture, said the importation animals act of 1922 will become effective on April 1st next. Birkhead, Manchester, Glasgow, Dundee and Cardiff will have been approved, Bristol, he said, would be added to the list as soon as arrangements could be completed.

There was a proposal to also establish landing places at Aberdeen, Leith, Newcastle, Hull, Birwhich, London, Southampton and Falmouth. Therefore facilities for landing Canadian cattle would not be inadequate.

Replying to another question, Sir Robert Sanders, said he understood the first shipment of Canadian steers could be made to Great Britain on or about April 1st. He possessed no powers to control or regulate the method of sale. The Minister added that the claims of department for port of disembarkation were receiving consideration.

RED ROSES IN HONEY TUBERCULOSIS CURE

PARIS, Mar. 13—An old oriental remedy for tuberculosis practised 1,000 years ago by the Arab doctor, Avicenna, has been revived at Paris. It has been presented to the French Academy of Medicine by its modern advocate, another wise man from the East, Dr. Dinguizli, of Tunis.

The remedy is simply a concoction of red roses preserved in honey. According to Dr. Dinguizli, he has cured many cases of tuberculosis and aided many others with it. Its curative properties are supposed to reside in the tannin and sugar, which cause the patient to put on weight and stop coughing.

Crisis Reached In Ruhr District

(Special to The Guardian.)
BRUSSELS, Mar. 13—Four hours of almost deliberations at the foreign office here this afternoon led to several important decisions regarding the Ruhr situation which the French and Belgian statesmen present admitted had now reached a crisis.

Critics of the decision was an outline of what the Franco-Belgian terms will be when Germany asks for terms in the official communication. The condition that two governments resolved not to evacuate the Ruhr, nor other territory occupied on the right bank of the Rhine on Germany promises but only to leave as Germany fulfills her reparations obligations.
