GOOD PRICES FOR FURS AT PARIS AUCTION

Island Offering Disposed of At Least 10 Per Cent. Above the Average of Last Season's Sales Prices.

The P. E. I. Fur Pool Ltd. of Summerside, have just received a cable advice from their Paris agents to the effect that as a result of the first Paris auction sales on Dec. 21 and 22 their whole offering was disposed of at prices at least 10 percent above the average of last season's sales prices for the same quality of goods.

AUSTRALIA WILL SEND DELEGATION

MELBOURNE, Australia, Dec. 23.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Australia will send a strong delegation to the Imperial Economic Conference which is expected to be held at Ottawa next July.

Prime Minister Joseph Lyons will be accompanied by Senator Alexander MacLachlan, who was an honorary Minister in the former Bruce coalition government; Hon. James Fenton, former Labor Minister of Trade; Hon. H. S. Gullett, prominent Nationalist, who is expected to be the new Minister of Trade and Customs; R. A. Parkhill and J. A. Guy, outstanding members of the United Australia party.

WILL STAND TRIAL FOR MURDER

BRIDGEWATER, N. S., Dec. 23.—(By The Canadian Press)—Naaman Smith of Nineveh will stand trial for the murder of Lem Smith, his uncle, at the spring Supreme Court session at Lunenburg. The twenty-one year old youth who was captured on Tuesday, December 15, thirty-two hours after Lem had fallen in a Pleasant River Woodlot, a bullet between the eyes, was committed by Magistrate Bigelow today at the conclusion of his preliminary hearing.

"Magic power" and "special thought" were attributed to Lem and Fay Smith and Goldie Veniot by the writer of two notes found in the pocket of a black raincoat picked up near Lem Smith's body and signed "Naaman Smith." Gates Smith, father of Naaman, identified the raincoat as belonging to himself. It was missing from its nail a week ago Monday morning. Naaman Smith had made a statement to him that "I killed Lem Smith" Sergeant Kehoe of the Nova Scotia police told the court. It was Sergeant Kehoe who arrested Smith in William Faulkenham's kitchen at Pleasant River.

AUSTRALIAN CABINET NOT YET COMPLETE

To Imperial Conference Which Is Expected To Be Held At Ottawa Next July.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Dec. 23.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Prime Minister Joseph Lyons announced tonight his Cabinet was not yet complete, but he indicated certain posts had been definitely filled. He also announced the personnel of the Australian delegation to the imperial economic conference. He stated the Commonwealth Parliament would open not later than Feb. 20, next, and announced that Hon. J. G. Latham, leader of the Nationalist party and new attorney-general, will be the Australian delegate to the world disarmament conference opening at Geneva on Feb. 2.

Japanese Issue Final Warning To The Chinese

Will Eliminate All Undesirable Forces From The Entire District Of The Liao River.

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Dec. 23.—The intention of extending its "bandit suppression" campaign to eliminate "all undesirable forces from the entire district west of the Liao River," in the direction of Chinchow was revealed in a statement issued by Japanese army headquarters.

"In case any party attempts to obstruct our action," the statement added, "we will absolutely have no hesitation in eliminating them, regardless to what faction they may belong."

Although the communique did not mention the Chinese army at Chinchow, it was interpreted as being a final warning to Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang's forces to withdraw within the Great Wall, and as signifying the beginning of a more intensive drive into southwest Manchuria.

LONDON, Dec. 23. (A.P.)—A blizzard has paralyzed traffic on the Black Sea—the mosques of Turkey are etched with snow—and the whole European scene from icy Lapland to the luxurious Mediterranean shores is set for a good old fashioned Christmas.

Storms which swept southward over the continent during the last week have in most countries left behind them the beauty and peace of snowscapes after causing suffering by needy people and a series of minor shipwrecks.

PROMINENT NEW BRUNSWICK MAN DEAD

FREDERICTON, N. B., Dec. 23.—(By the Canadian Press)—Lieutenant-Colonel Thomas G. Loggie, 77, at one time Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines in the New Brunswick Government, and for the last fifty years prominent in the militia, and other activities of the province, died here tonight after an illness of three weeks. He took a sudden turn for the worse at the Victoria Hospital last evening, and the end came there. His only living son, Lt.-Col. Gerald Loggie of Ottawa, is expected here tomorrow. Another son, Purvis, died in England during the World War from wounds received in action. The only other relative is a sister, Mrs. E. S. Harrison, of this city.

CALL FOR AID

SEATTLE, Dec. 23.—(A.P.)—The Harbor radio reported that today it received a call for aid from the tug Roosevelt, sent to tow the schooner Commodore from off Cape Flattery and Puget Sound. The tug said it was shipping water. The Roosevelt is the ship on which Admiral Peary made his discovery-trip to the North Pole.

FIFTY MISSING

TOKYO, Dec. 24.—(Thursday)—Fifty Passengers were reported missing this morning following a collision on the Inland Sea between two coastwise vessels, the Yaezama Maru and the Kansai Maru, in which the former sank. The Inland Sea is between the islands of Honshu and Shikoku.
