REMOVING BOER PRISONERS.

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 2.—(Special).—The military administration has determined, it is reported to deport all Boers in the reconcentrated camps, numbering over one hundred thousand, to the garrison towns on the coast where food is more readily available.

THE MINES TO BE REOPENED.

The railway, thus relieved, will suffice to supply food to Johannesburg, which is as large as before the war and will permit reopening all the mines at once. MORE BOERS FOR BERMUDA.

St. VINCENT, Sept. 2.—(Special).—The steamship Montrose from Cape Town with 301 British troops and 94 Boers arrived here and proceeds to Bermuda.

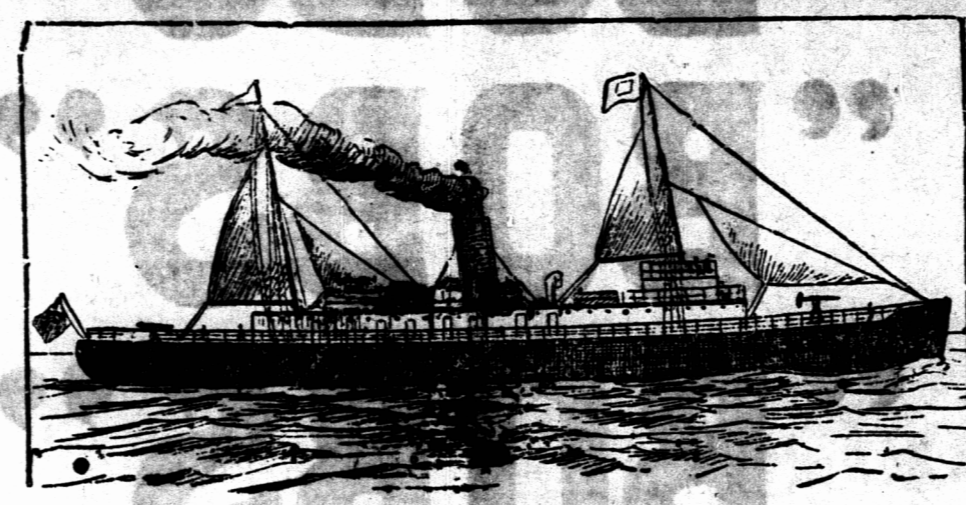

BLAZE ON THE MINTO

The Engine Room Badly Guttled

TURPENTINE AND OIL

Add Greatly to the Disaster—Repairs are now Being Made

Shortly after six o'clock on Sunday morning an alarm for a fire in the engine room of the steamer Minto was sent in. Upon enquiry THE GUARDIAN learned that John Groom a fireman was the first on board the ship to discover the fire. He called to others and they in turn communicated with the third engineer and he instructed Harry Crockett an oiler to send in an alarm and summon the first and second engineers who were at their homes. Mr. Currie the third engineer then ran down into the engine room and endeavored to extinguish the flames with the ship's pumps but found the heat too intense and was compelled to return to the deck, not without burning his hands severely. He then awaited the arrival of the fire brigade who responded promptly and led the way down through the stoke hold into the lower engine room and the firemen fought the fire from that point. Shortly before the arrival of the brigade a five gallon tank of turpentine exploded also a five gallon tank of paint oil. Both tanks had been filled on Saturday preparatory to going to sea. After playing on the fire for 45 minutes the blaze was extinguished. No cause can be assigned for the fire. Shortly after eight on Saturday evening when the Chief and Second Engineers left the ship everything was right, all the lights being out and only a fire under the donkey boiler some 40 or 50 feet from the scene of the blaze. Everything in the engine room had been looked over preparatory to going to sea. The engine room doors were locked by second Engineer Clark before he left the ship. The only entrance to the engine room was through the stoke hold and by way of firemen's forecastle.

U. S. POST OFFICE DEPARTMENTS.

The United States Post Office Department is now almost self-supporting. The report for the last fiscal year has not yet been issued, but official estimates state that the year's deficit will not exceed between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000. This is the lowest deficit ever recorded. In 1898 the excess of expenditures amounted to \$5,100,000. It rose pretty steadily until 1897, when it reached \$11,400,000, and then began to fall rapidly, reaching \$5,300,000 in the twelve months ending June 30, 1900.

TO SUCCEED THE CRESCENT.

HALIFAX, N. S., August 30.—It is said at the Dock Yard that H. M. S. Blake is named to succeed the Crescent, flagship on this station. The latter's three years' commission on this station will expire next Spring.

OPPOSED TO REFORM

The Rev. Harry M. Leugel, the founder and builder of the Church of the Followers of God, preached a sermon to 700 people at Ephrata, Pa., on Sunday. In his sermon he deplored the tendency of some of the churches, through the introduction of paid choirs, individual communion cups and automatic speakers. "I suppose the next thing you will hear of," he said, "will be the use of the phonograph. Few of the churches are teaching the true gospel."
