Security Police Reveal Spy Story

MONTREAL, Jan. 14 (CP) — The files of the R.A.F. Security Police, hitherto a closed book, today revealed the story of a plot to destroy the Montreal airport at Dorval, jumping off point for aircraft being flown to Britain, containing the tale of a pretty Canadian girl, daughter of a German mother, and an escaped German prisoner of war.

The girl, whose name was not released, was one of the busy stenographers with the R.A.F. Transport Command in 1943, and always had dates with airmen. She devoted four nights a week to lonely flyers, but her escorts found her questions much too pointed. Security guards were advised and the Service Police began to watch the girl. She was earning \$60 a month with the Transport Command, and her mother earned \$64 a month. They lived in an apartment rented at \$176.

Police discovered the three nights a week were spent at mysterious meetings with civilians. Then they questioned her, and the stenographer fainted. There was not sufficient evidence to lay a charge, but the girl was dismissed soon after, she moved to the United States with her mother, where American Intelligence men intercepted a parcel addressed to Montreal. It contained detailed plans of a Boston ship yard, and specifications of a battleship to be launched there, as well as information on Montreal Airport. U.S. officials went to pick up the girl and her mother, but they had disappeared. Later they were traced to Argentina.

The following winter, many German prisoners who escaped from internment camps were caught in ditches near the coast. One man who asked for a hot dog at a roadside restaurant not far from Dorval, aroused the curiosity of the girl behind the counter. Police were called, and once again Capt. von Forster, a German U-boat commander, was under guard.
