And that labor cannot live without the fuel to keep the life blood coursing through its veins, giving it strength for these accomplishments. Wheat is the principal and main ingredient of that life giving fuel, AND THE BUSHEL OF WHEAT SOLD FOR A DOLLAR OF THE ALIEN'S READY CASH, ADDING A BARE DOLLAR TO OUR BANK RESERVES, IF USED AS THE FUEL TO OUR NATIVE LABOR AND INDUSTRY, WOULD GIVE FIVE TIMES THIS CASH VALUE IN THE FORM OF THESE PERMANENT AND PROFIT PRODUCING ASSETS TO OUR COUNTRY.

When the Western farmer delivers to a band of mechanics a thousand bushels of wheat and receives in exchange for it an added barn or an equivalent in carriages, furniture or agricultural implements it is not a case of "doing each others washing." By his labor in producing the wheat he has realized its value in these assets of actual value which exist there as a genuine and visible addition to the wealth of the country.
