**POLICE COURT**

One autoist was fined \$10.00 and costs for infraction of the Motor Vehicle Act at the Police Court Saturday morning and another was put on probation.

Three prohibition cases were heard and adjourned. One of said cases, that of a party charged with brewing beer which tested over the required percentage permitted by the law. However, complications arose in so far that the accused had a permit from the Excise and Customs Department for making beer for family use only, which was proved conclusively by the defendant, who was represented by Council.

Mr. J. J. Johnson, K. C., defending lawyer quoted certain sections of the Prohibition Act going into it very thoroughly. He said a permit was a license, a permission or an authority to make beer for family use so long as said brew was made and consumed under the one roof, and added that the Prohibition Act recognizes that fact. He said that the Excise Act does not define what a license is, it is just a permission to make beer for one's personal use. "I don't know whether Your Honor's attention was ever called to a case of this kind before," said Mr. Johnson, to which His Honor replied in the negative; he also mentioned that he never had occasion to read sections 40 or 41 of the act. He concluded by stating that there was just one question, and that was as to whether the accused is a brewer under the Customs and Excise Act or not. This case will be continued this morning.

**A Veteran Newspaper Man**



J. Sutton Boyd, veteran Editor of the Daily Times, Moncton, N. B., who was honored Wednesday evening, April 25, by the citizens of "The Hub of the Maritimes," at a complimentary banquet tendered him in honor of his 70th birthday which coincides with his 56th anniversary as a member of the staff of the Daily Times. Despite his having reached the allotted span, Mr. Boyd is still exceptionally active, and has a capacity for work that would astonish a man 20 years his junior. He entered the service of the Weekly Times when 14 years old, as a newsboy and "printer's devil," and has had the experience in all branches of the publishing business. He became editor of the Daily Times in 1889. His continuous service with one newspaper is unique in the annals of Canadian journalism.

Mr. Boyd has received congratulations from the leading men in the political and business sphere all over Canada, as well as from newspapermen between the Atlantic and Pacific.

**BLACK HAND SHADOW**

(By British United Press)  
PARIS, April 28. - A dramatic version is circulated of the plan for the murder of the Paris of an Italian Fascist, Angelo Savorelli. It tells of a kind of anti-Fascist black hand organization operating in Paris.

Savorelli was lurching at a friend's apartment. A mysterious telephone message came, and then someone rang the door bell which Savorelli answered. Three revolver shots were fired, and Savorelli fell dead.

His murderer is described as a one-armed man, said to have been formerly a postal official in Venetia.

There were Communist riots in his part of Venetia six years ago, and he was shot in the right arm. He escaped to France, but later had to have his arm off.

It is alleged that Savorelli was recently sentenced to death by an anti-Fascist tribunal in Paris, presided over by an anarchist Italian ex-prosecutor.

According to the amazing story now told, the "professor" and his friends on the secret tribunal were wondering how the "sentence" was to be carried out when they heard that the one-armed anti-Fascist had received money from the "condemned" man.

The Venetian ex-postal official was called before the tribunal, which sat in a little back room in a cafe kept by an Italian near the Place de la Republique. He was accused of having sold himself to the Fascists. He protested, but admitted that he had taken money from Savorelli.

The Minister, Rev. W. Bruce Muir, delivered a very impressive and forceful address. He took his text from Prov. chap. 19, V. 4, and spoke in part as follows:

"A man that hath friends must show himself friendly, and there is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother."

Friendship has been esteemed by some to be the greatest and purest thing on earth, by others a means to personal gain.

Two of the greatest pagan philosophers did not believe that such a thing as disinterested friendship ever existed. But the moral condition of a nation must be corrupt below the point of recovery, when the great and moral element of friendship can be dealt with in such a spirit of cynicism and disparagement.

Whatever the primary reference to our text may be, it outlines the character of the friendship of Christ, the saviour and friend of sinners, who is not ashamed to call you and me "brother." His friendship is absolutely disinterested. How could it be otherwise. Was it to bless himself or others that he left his Father's house, and came down to us on earth to be laid in a manger stall? Through all His life, He helped his fellowman. And finally He passed through the agonies of Gethsemane, and suffered a death of shame upon the cross for us. Where is there a friendship greater than that? "Greater love hath no man than this, that He lay down his life for his friends." But He while we were yet sinners and enemies, laid down His life for us.

Many of our friendships are fleeting—they fade and die with greater knowledge—they are founded upon ignorance. But a friendship which grows and increases with knowledge is likely to be a lifelong one. Such is the friendship of that Friend who sticketh closer than a brother. He is ignorant of our failings; He knows the very thoughts of our hearts.

Friendship is based on constancy. Many earthly friendships pass away in various different ways; they die gradually away, or perish from jealousy or misrepresentation.

But Christ's friendship is not like that. His friendship endures while life shall last and through eternity.

The sin that remains in our nature does not keep him from being the friend that sticketh closer than a brother. Without that friend on life's pilgrimage we shall at the last stand speechless before Almighty God.

Earth's friendships are dear to us and valuable, but we must seek the friendship of that Friend of friends.

Not any merit or work of ours can give us any standing in the sight of God, but His friendship ever pleads for us before the throne of Grace.

Mr. Muir then went on to compliment the Odd Fellows on their turnout. He had seen many parades, but had never seen a finer body of men than those who had marched down Pownall Street that morning. It was a splendid proof of their enthusiasm and efficiency. He felt sure that they would ever exercise an uplifting influence upon the life of the city of Charlottetown.

"Let us remember," he said, "that true friendship never ends with the storm, and shine brightest in the darkest hours." He wished every success to Wilsey and St. Lawrence Lodges, and to the members of Alpha Rebecca Lodge who were present at the service.
