JAMES ANDREW JOHNSTONE

A gloom has been cast over Long River and vicinity by the sad and sudden death of James Andrew Johnstone, the dearly loved and only son of Mr and Mrs. Johnstone, who died on Friday evening July 18th. Deceased who was in his eighteenth year was a young man of exceptional promise. For several years, he had been working with his father in the carriage-building and trucking business, and had become a recognized genius few young men were better known or better beloved, none could fail to be impressed by his manliness and kindness of heart, he was the very soul of truth and honesty. While the death of such a one is a distinct loss to the community, it is on the home of which he was the very life the blow falls most heavily and the heart felt sympathy of hosts of friends goes out the sorrowing father, mother, little sister and aged grandfather, in their irreplaceable loss.

The funeral (which was one of the largest ever seen in Long River) was conducted by the Rev. George Millar (of whose church James Andrew was a member) assisted by Rev. Mr. Fies of Kensington. The floral tributes were many and beautiful, and the casket was borne by six schoolmates, Edwin Johnstone, Elwood Campbell, James Montgomery, Ambrose Brennan, Lester Duggan and David Pazar. The remains were laid to rest in the "Goddie Memorial Cemetery." I cannot say and I will not say that he is dead, he is just away. With a cheery smile and a wave of the hand. He left us and went to an unknown land. Yes, left us dreaming, how very faithful it needs must be since he lingers there.

DANIEL J. McDONALD.

A good man has gone to his reward in the person of Daniel J. McDonald (the mason), Black Point, Lot 47. Mr. McDonald was not well for the past year. On the 10th inst. he took a sudden weak spell. The family became alarmed and the priests of the diocese all being on Retreat, a telephone message was sent to Charlottetown for a priest, who forthwith arrived by the evening train at Elmiria, and who administered the last sacraments to the dying man. He rallied afterwards, but before the week had ended, passed away. He was buried at St. Columba cemetery Saturday, 19th, with mass of requiem and obsequies at the grave. The funeral was large and representative showing in a striking manner the esteem in which he was held by friends, neighbors and acquaintances. For the first twenty-five or more years after attaining manhood, Mr. McDonald followed the mason trade generally, assisted in the work by his brothers, James and Joseph. Most of the mason work on buildings, foundations, kilns, etc., in Souris and Eastern Kings were built by Mr. McDonald and his brothers, hence, "Dan the mason," "Jim the mason," so familiar to these brothers in the trade. His father, John J. McDonald, possessed a large tract of land at Black Point, and apportioned it to his five sons, Daniel, James, Joseph, George and Angus, another son, James John, was given a farm not far away. All these brothers, including Daniel, built houses, married and settled on the old homestead, all are living except James George and Dan (the subject). He prospered farming as he did masonry. He leaves one son, John Aeneas, at home, and another son, Charles, settled at East Lake as also his wife. May his soul rest in peace.

MATERIAL TALENTS TRANSMITTED TO SONS

There are numerous instances in history in which parents possessing uncommon gifts are supposed to have passed them on to their children. This is especially the case in regard to musical talents.

The mother of Schumann, for instance, had great musical ability. Chopin received his wonderful gift—and also his delicate constitution—from the maternal side; Gounod's mother was exceedingly fond of music, while the mother of Spohr, the German composer, was an excellent judge of music and a fine critic, without being herself a musician.

Sir Walter Raleigh declared that he inherited from his mother the politeness of deportment which ever distinguished him. Goethe pays frequent tribute in his writings to the character and culture of his mother, as does also the poet Wordsworth.

Sydney Smith believes that he inherited from his mother his rare conversational powers and quickness of repartee. It is well known that the mother of Edward Gibbon, the historian, was a great reader and cultivated the same taste and habit as her son.

The mother of Charles Darwin made herself acquainted with all the branches of natural history, and entertained a great fondness for animals. This record seems to show that maternal talents and tastes are frequently transmitted to sons; it is also claimed that the gifts of the fathers usually descend to the daughters.—Tit-Bits.

A CANADIAN DOCTOR WHO MADE GOOD

Dr. Risdon, Son of Mr. John Risdon of Charlottetown, Won World-wide Fame in His Profession.

Reflected glory has come to St. Thomas, many times, through the heroism of its gallant sons throughout the horrors of the past five years, says a St. Thomas, Ont., Exchange. But out of the most terrible of all horrors, that of a bonny face torn and disfigured by hurtling shell and shrapnel, a St. Thomas lad, Capt. Fulton Risdon, C. A. M. C., has built up a continental reputation and "fame for the magic touch in restoring shattered and torn fragments of humanity that came to him from the battle line." Captain Risdon's contemporary and co-worker in this wonderful work has been Major C. W. Waldron, another Toronto doctor, and known in town, being a nephew of Mrs. W. R. Beville, Pearl Street, each having taken courses in pre-war days in Chicago and New York, specializing in oral work, ear, nose, throat, jaws everything pertaining to the head, excepting the eye. Captain Risdon is the bone-grafting expert, the favorite place for setting a new jawbone, being the building and backing business, and it has gotten to the stage that there is no discharge after the second day. The writer has run across four pictures which appeared in Toronto papers of Pte. Blank's face in successive stages of reconstruction. With a heart that one looks at the first time, and with a sigh of contentment at the last, a face redeemed after having a left jaw fractured, upper gum and roof of mouth blown away, the right part of the nose gone, with a ragged tear from the left corner of the mouth. He spent nine months with Capt. Risdon, and was unable to speak for six weeks after being wounded at Vimy Ridge, but he speaks now with never a lisp, thanks to Major Waldron and Capt. Fulton Risdon. Pte. Blank has seen a man whose chin was shot away, so that his tongue lay upon his throat, and these surgical wizards, removed flesh from the chest and built up a new face, not a poor mask or a scarred monstrosity, but a real face; also a man whose nose had been shot away, where the doctors had removed a piece of cartilage from his ribs, grafting it in his forehead. When it had grown on, this cartilage was brought down into place for the bridge of his nose, the forehead being treated in such a way that never a scar was left. Case after case could be mentioned of men who had ears rebuilt, masks and replicas made by artists, Lt. Walter Duff being especially mentioned. When a patient whose eye socket is gone so that a glass eye is impossible the doctors close up the socket, a man's face becomes cheek right up to his eyebrow. Lt. Duff then paints an eye to match the other on a flesh colored background. This is put on and taken with a pair of spectacles. The eye sets back behind the glass just as a real one does, not noticeable on the street, and when the patient comes indoors he takes off the spectacles and of course his eye goes too. Major Waldron has already come home, and Captain Risdon is expected home the end of the month with his English bride. They have been assigned a very beautiful hospital at St. Anne de Bellevue, near Montreal, for the summer where a hundred and sixty of their patients have already arrived, and will remain until September, when they will be removed to Toronto to continue their work. Many of these poor lads have come to Captain Risdon's mother in Toronto to exhibit with pride the work her son has performed, and no wonder they are extravagant in their praise of her son, Captain Risdon is in the English Hospital at Sidcup, Kent, and it was at the Chislehurst Golf Club, a couple of miles from Sidcup, that romance touched the life of Captain Fulton Risdon, in Miss Sylvia Bosworth, whose marriage was reported a fortnight ago. Mrs. Risdon's who is, like of all of Captain Risdon's family, very musical, is the daughter of Mr. Bosworth, of the Bosworth publishers, a name which has been familiar to many, looking back at them from music covers from childhood up. Captain Risdon, it will be remembered, is the son and brother of Mr. and Mrs. John Risdon and Miss Lula Risdon, of Toronto and formerly of our town, Miss Risdon and Mrs. J. B. Davidson are cousins.

Captain Risdon is a son of Mr. John Risdon the popular representative in this city of the Messrs Frost & Wood Co., the Guardian heartily congratulates him on his brilliant son.
