Whirlaway Goes To Post "Half Dressed"; Comes Home First In Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 4.—(AP)—By sending Whirlaway to the post only "half dressed" Ben Jones, the magic man from Missouri, may have won the Kentucky Derby for his chestnut cannonball.

While Whirlaway and some of the gallant gallopers who chased him home in Saturday's record-smashing run were being packed up today for the trip to the Preakness next Saturday, it came to light that Whirlaway appears to have gone to the post with only one blinker and that this, with Jockey Eddie Arcaro's help, may have caused him to run straight.

This is no guarantee he'll win the Preakness, despite the bolt of lightning with which he struck the Churchill Downs stretch, and which probably won't be duplicated at a fast track in a long time.

Newspaper photographers showing Whirlaway nearly head-on as he charged down the stretch disclosed there was a blinker on only one side—over his right, or outside eye. The left eye, nearest the rail, was uncovered.

In his last two races, he ran out as he rounded into the stretch, and this caused his defeat in both instances. With his outside eye covered and his inside one bare, it probably tended to keep him from going in the direction in which he couldn't see.

Far down the track and out of the money as he came home all by himself were the "big n.r.s." of this race—Charley (Lucky) Howard's Porter's Cap and Royce Martin's Our Boots.

Only the gelding in 1939 and old Rosebud in 1914 ever made such a show of their field. The only contest in the race found the rank outsider in the field, Hugh Nesbitt's Satorator, driving to a neck decision over another long-hot, the New York owned Market Wise, from the barn of Lou Tufano, for second place.

Many fine plays Made in Cup series

REGINA, May 4.—(CP)—Allan Cup notes.

Regina Rangers' victory in the sixth game over Sydney Millionaires brought the cup to the West for the 16th time since Sir Montagu Allan donated it in 1908. The East has won it 18 times.
