## Imports Exceed Exports By 13 Millions

(Canadian Press)  
OTTAWA, April 19.—Trade returns of March issued by the Department of National Revenue show that imports totalled more than 120,000,000 dollars and exceeded exports by thirteen millions. For the fiscal year ended with March 31, however, exports were greater than imports by 140,000,000.

Total exports of Canadian products for the year were \$1,226,287,000 and of foreign produce \$2,207,016 while total imports for the year were \$1,108,821,649.

## Depew Left Million Dollars To Yale University

(Special to the Guardian)  
NEW YORK, April 19.—Chauncey M. Depew, Railroad Executive, orator and humorist who died April 15, left \$1,000,000—the largest single bequest of a total exceeding \$2,200,000—to Yale University, his alma mater. The bequest carried no restrictions.

Filing of the will today of the former United States Senator and Chairman of the New York Central Railroad directed distribution of an estate the value of which is not yet known between his school, relatives, servants and the village of Peekskill where he was born nearly 84 years ago.

His native village receives \$100,000 in trust for educational and other purposes and a sum is provided for maintenance of the Depew Mausoleum at Peekskill where he is buried.

Mr. Depew's second wife, May Palmer, in lieu of dower rights receives \$200,000 in accordance with an ante-nuptial agreement made December 27, 1901, a further bequest of \$150,000, on half the residuary estate during life and some personal effects.

### THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)  
OTTAWA, April 19 (Eggs)—There is no change reported from Canadian egg markets today.

TORONTO—The local situation is unchanged with dealers buying from country shippers at extras 23-30; firsts 27-28; seconds 22-23 delivered, cases returned.

WINNIPEG—There has been no change in the market situation since the beginning of the week. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 27; firsts 25; seconds 21.

VANCOUVER—This egg market is steady. Dealers are buying from producers at extras 23-24; firsts 20-21; pullet extras 18-19.

HALIFAX—This market is holding steady. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 28; firsts 25; seconds 20 cents.

MONTREAL, Que., April 19.—The export trade in Canadian grain here today was extremely dull owing to the fact that foreign buyers failed to respond to local exporters' views. The domestic trade was also quiet but the undertone was firm.

The demand for spring and winter wheat grades of flour was of a limited character but prices were unchanged. A fairly active trade was done in all lines of millfeed and prices were well maintained. There was no change in prices for standard grades of rolled oats, but the undertone was strong. The wholesale and jobbing trade in eggs continued good and values were firm. The receipts were 1,790 cases. The trade in potatoes continued dull but the undertone to the market was steady. Prices for imported beans ruled firm under a moderate demand from all sources.

A feature of the butter trade was the marked improvement in demand from local buyers and more active business was accomplished with the result that prices advanced 1-4 to 1-2 cent per lb. There was some demand from local buyers for fodder made cheese today and sales of eastern no. 1 white and colored were made at 1-2 cent per lb. while western was quoted at 20 cents per lb. The receipts were 455 boxes.
