LOVE APPLIED.
Try to love your work. No matter what it may be, it must have some interesting side. Look for this interest; don't let it baffle you, but peg away until you conquer by the sheer force of the work you do. At the day's end you will be surprised to find how many tasks have been completed and how happily the busy hours have passed.
FICHUS AND CUFFS.
Fichus, collars of innumerable variety of shape are now a most important feature of the wardrobe, forming often a trimming finish for a plain bodice. The fichus are wonderfully useful in modernizing an old gown. They are made of net, chiffon, batiste and points d'esprit, and are really most effective when trimmed in quaint, old-fashioned style. A simple and most attractive trimming is made of a double ruche of the material, and an attractive variation from the pleating of net is the shirring or double puffing of the material used as a border around the fichu. With almost all these adjustable trimmings for the bodice there are cuffs of trimmings of some sort for the bottom of the sleeve, and when there are not, some trimming is usually made for the sleeve to complete the effect. For the long tight fitting sleeve, so graceful and distinguished looking when it is becoming, there are lace or embroidered linen ruffles that are attractive and do wonders toward making the hands look pretty.
For the elbow or three-quarter sleeve there are turn back cuffs to match the collars or overblouses, and these cuffs are, many of them, finished with little frills of fine batiste, net or lace, even when the overblouse itself is not ruffled.
When selecting a white or linen-colored accessory of this kind it is well for the woman who must consider even the small items of expenditure, which are constantly necessary if one is to look fresh day by day, to choose the material of the collar or overblouse which may be easily laundered, so that a visit to the cleaner's will not be required whenever the collar must be freshened.
