LEVINSKY LOSES TO DOYLE IN LONDON BOUT

Chicago Fighter Shows Gameness In Defeat; McAvoy Wins British Title

LONDON, April 27—(AP)—Jack Doyle, the Irish tenor, struck another blow for British boxing prestige tonight when he gave Kingfish Levinsky of Chicago a brutal 12-round beating at Wembley Stadium before a crowd of 11,400 which included King Farouk of Egypt.

Coming on top of Tommy Farr's triumph over Max Baer a couple of weeks ago, Doyle's victory did much to dispel the legend of "horizontal" British heavyweights.

From the third round on the Kingfish was weaving around the ring with blood streaming from cuts on his face.

Levinsky Game

Levinsky, who always has boasted he can "take it," never went down. Even when it was obvious he was in for a beating, the former Chicago fish peddler continued to fight back and to do his best to land a damaging punch.

Doyle, who took Levinsky's weak efforts with a cynical smile on his face throughout the bout, attributed his failure to score a knockout to the fact he broke a knuckle in his right hand in the second round.

Speaking carefully between puffed lips, the Kingfish said he was glad he had given Doyle a good fight. "He's a lot better man than they think back home," Levinsky said. "He hits hard."

Big Surprise... Unanimously picked to finish last by the experts, Jimmy Wilson and his Philadelphia Phillies broke all records by starting out with two victories on opening day.

Greatest Hitting Streak... Gerald Walker, ex-crown of Detroit, had the greatest day with a single, double, triple, and home run in as many chances but Morrie Aronovich reeled off the best hitting streak—seven safe blows in a row.

Worst Start... Cincinnati's Reds were left at the post with four straight defeats... two by one run, one by two runs and another by three.

Freakiest Start For Batter... Mel Ott, "Little Hot Foot" of New York Giants, didn't make a hit until the third game. Then, he got two homers in succession.
