MacLennan, Provincial Farm Forum Secretary, on the purposes and formation of Farm Rad'o Forums. All these lectures were well received and the audience acquired a fund of valuable information.

Association Congratulated Before the closing of the course, Rev. M. E. Francis of the St. Dunstan's College Extension Department of P.E.I.; and Mr. J. G. Dennis, Managing Director of the Cooperative Union of P.E.I.; and Mr. Leo J. Corcoran, Assistant Supervisor of Credit Unions, spoke briefly, congratulating the Alberton Fishermen's Cooperative Association formed less than a year ago, on their splendid achievement in that short period of time and also the Progress Credit Union of Alberton which has recently taken on a large number of new members during the past month. Unfortunately the weather was not too propitious during the course, and, as a consequence, the attendance left much to be desired. But in spite of that handicap, a great deal was accomplished and the eight Study Groups organized on the last day of the course will help to follow up the good work done.

Short Course At Alberton

A four-day short course for farmers and fishermen, sponsored by the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's College, was put on at Alberton, December 3rd to 6th. As in the past, St. Dunstan's Extension Department was generously assisted by fieldmen from the Departments of Agriculture and Fisheries, both Provincial and Federal.

The highlight of the first day of the course was an eloquent address by the Rev. J.D. Nelson MacDonald, U.N.S. The Rev. Mr. MacDonald is one of the outstanding promoters of Credit Unions and Cooperatives in Nova Scotia. He divided his lecture into two parts: in the first part he stressed the necessity of the Cooperative Movement in economic life to the end, on one hand, of curbing the strange hold that monopolies and cartels have on the economic life of our country, and on the other to prevent the country from drifting into Communism.

Must Work Together Mr. MacDonald outlined the second part of his lecture: "Building up by Breaking Down". He pointed out in his eloquent and vigorous style that if the "common people" would retain within their own hands the share of the wealth they themselves produce, they must organize, get together and work together, with a view to owning and thereby controlling the various economic institutions which they themselves built. In order to do this, the Reverend gentleman said, the common people must overcome the differences and prejudices which have hitherto kept them apart. Thus racial, religious, political and social prejudices must not be tolerated. All must join hands and work together regardless of race, color, class or creed, for the common welfare of all. He vigorously scored the tactics of those who from selfish motives fanatically promote race hatred and religious prejudice for the express purpose of keeping the common people divided that they might be the more easily exploited.

A vote of thanks to Rev. Mr. MacDonald moved by the Rev. Dr. Monaghan and seconded by Rod MacNeil of the O'Leary Co-op, and supported by the Reverend Mr. Fraser, United Church, Alberton, was enthusiastically adopted by the meeting and presented to the Reverend speaker. Reverend Mr. Fraser, in his remarks, expressed regret that a larger audience had not been present to have heard Mr. MacDonald's masterly address. He suggested that had the course been held during the summer months, undoubtedly many more persons would have availed themselves of the opportunity to hear Mr. MacDonald.

Soil Erosion Serious The principal speaker of the second day was Mr. J. E. McIntyre, Agricultural Agent of the C.N.R. Moncton. Mr. McIntyre's address was prefaced by the showing of a film depicting the ravage of soil erosion in Northwest Canada, and the means employed to combat it. Remarking on the film, Mr. McIntyre reminded Prince Edward Island farmers, that although it is not so noticeable here as in western Canada, yet soil erosion is playing serious havoc with our fertile loose soil and that steps should be taken to combat it. Mr. McIntyre's lecture, illustrated with slides, was most interesting and informative. He dealt principally with soil analysis and the correct use of commercial fertilizers. Two interesting slides showing a farm animal "before and after" emphasized the fact that soils deficient in health-giving minerals, produce plants also deficient in the same minerals, so that the health of animals and man eating the food produced on such soils would necessarily be impaired. Hence one of the reasons for soil analysis.
