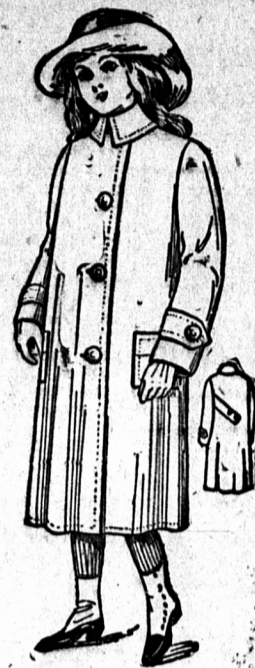
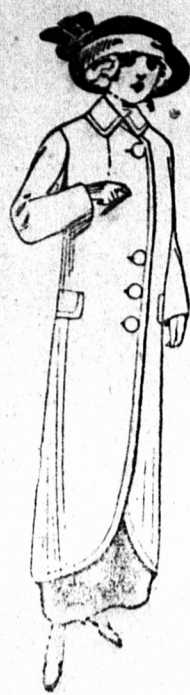

NEGRO RUNS AMUCK OVER MONEY IN BAR.

TORONTO, October 21.—Enraged over the amount of "money" he had laid on the bar in Smith's hotel, an unknown negro ran amuck at 11 o'clock last night, slashing four people with a razor, one of whom, John Consworth, a porter at the hotel, lies at the general hospital in a critical condition. The negro up to an early hour this morning had not been caught by the police. Consworth was slashed across the neck, inflicting a deep wound which compromised the jugular vein by one inch. Adam McKay, also attempted to

hold the negro for the police, also sustained a gash in his neck.

The next victim was William Thomson, a merchant, living at 3 Henry street, whom the negro met opposite the Queen City Hotel, at the corner of Queen and William streets. Stepping up to Thomson and exclaiming, "What do you want?" he slashed at him, inflicting a wound which extends from the neck six inches down the left shoulder. The fourth victim also is unknown, received a slight gash in the neck.

ARCHBISHOP OF DUBLIN ISSUES A WARNING.

DUBLIN, October 21.—The Roman Catholic Archbishop of Dublin has issued a letter warning Catholics against the scheme of the Transport Workers' Union of sending their children to England pending a settlement of the labor trouble, in as much as they do not whether the persons to whom the children are to be consigned are Roman Catholics or members of any other religion. The Archbishop is obviously alarmed at the championship of the socialists, who are running the scheme.
