AMERICAN'S THRILLING EXPERIENCE.
Mr. A. C. Parry, one of the building inspectors for the Western Union people, accompanied by his wife and child, motored from his home in Ridgeway, N. PERTH BANDITS GET JAIL TERMS OF THREE YEARS
PERTH, Aug. 12.—Sentences of three years respectively in Kingston Penitentiary were imposed by His Honor Judge Henderson Scott at the County of Lanark Criminal Court Session held today. The hold-up gang which robbed Harry's Restaurant on Fore Street Perth, on the night of July 26-27, and escaped to the suburbs of Ottawa with over \$200. Those sentenced were: Joseph Nazario, Antonio Maimo, Enari Barbetta, Pasquale Ballotto and Arthur Teolis. The two remaining members of the gang, in view of the evidence against them, were disposed of differently. Nicholas Marchiono, having been convicted as an accessory after the fact, was sentenced to serve two years less one day in the Ontario Reformatory. Evidence disclosed that he merely drove one of the bandits' cars and did not actually participate in the hold-up. He carried no revolver. The last man, Dominic Longo, was released on suspended sentence after being ordered by the judge to make full restitution to Harry Johnson, Chinese owner of the cafe robbed, for all money stolen, and further, to pay the costs of all court proceedings connected with the case. Longo, it was transpired, acted as driver for the second car

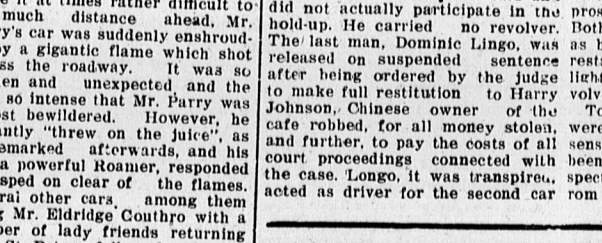
