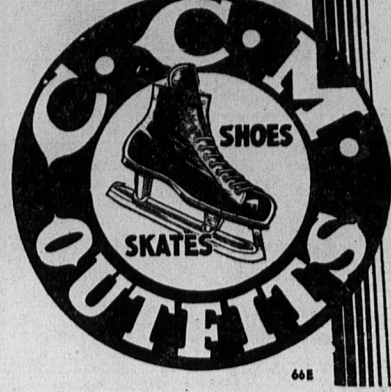

SAINT JOHN TO BE SCENE OF CH'SHIPS

MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—The Canadian indoor skating championships will be held at Saint John, N. B., and the North American indoor championships will be held at Toronto it was decided at the 46th annual meeting of the Amateur Skating Association of Canada held here over the week-end. W. E. It was decided the A. S. A. should pay no dues to the Amateur Athletic Association of Canada. The A. S. A. was an older body than the A. A. Opening Of Big Four Loop Tonight

Moncton & Halifax Scenes Of Initial Battles As Teams Start Long Trail Leading To Allan Cup.

HALIFAX, Nov. 19.—Bubbling over with confidence and determined to keep the "Allan Cup" down east," the Maritime Hockey League's four teams swing into action tonight to begin a schedule of 84 matches. Moncton Hawks will be at home to Charlottetown Abegweits, while Saint John Beavers cross sticks with Halifax Wolverines in the Nova Scotia capital. The St. John team entered the senior circuit of the seaside provinces this year, making it "the Big Four" instead of "The Big Three," as it was commonly known last season. Hawks line up almost the same as when they took the Maritime and Canadian amateur titles last season, but the other teams have been strengthened considerably. Six new men have donned Abegweit uniforms: Bill Walker from Moncton; Bill Gulliver and "Kick" McCann, Fredericton; Bill MacGlashen, Halifax, and Frank Currie and Pete Kelly, Montreal. Bill Cowley and Ed Porteous of Ottawa and Paul Gagnon of Montreal have joined the Wolverines. Gagnon may not play tomorrow night because there is still uncertainty about his transfer. Beavers, with a list of imported stars, are considered strong. They have Jack Draper, "Peck" Donald and "Ike" Houston from Ottawa; Barney Reist, former Queen's University star; Fred Penstone and Vic Wasbrood, Montreal, and a string of first-rate Maritime players including Kenzie McNeill from Halifax and Stevie Estabrook from Charlottetown. In exhibition games, Halifax Wolverines have appeared at top form, defeating Winnipeg All Stars and Atlantic City Sea Gulls. Hawks played draws with both these touring outfits, and Beavers suffered two defeats. Abegweits were defeated by the All Stars and did not play the Sea Gulls. James E. Wry of Amherst, President of the Maritime Hockey Association, will attend the game in Halifax tomorrow night, and Harold Tennant, Secretary-Registrar, will go to Moncton. The officials are chiefly interested in seeing whether or not one referee is enough to handle the games. There is keen opposition to this plan in some quarters.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—(A.P.)—New York Americans and Montreal Maroons played their second successive 2-2 tie in a strenuous National Hockey League struggle tonight. The draw left the A's at the bottom of the Canadian Division standing with the Maroons just ahead. Their game at Montreal Thursday ended with the same score. A crowd of 12,000 saw the game. Maroons were a bit lucky to divide the points as one of their goals came as a gift from their rivals and they were thoroughly outplayed toward the finish. In the overtime period they appeared well satisfied to hold their own. Early in the first period an accidental goal sent Montreal off to a head. Lloyd Gross, American rookie winger, tried to clear the puck away from his goal after goalie Roy Worters came out to block Hooley Smith's shot and he drove it right into the empty cage. Hooley got credit for the goal. That was the only score until the third frame. Then Marvin Wentworth poked in Baldy Northcott's long pass and touched off an American attack that didn't let up until the score was tied. Normie Himes notched the first New York tally on a backhand shot after getting Gross' pass from behind the goal. Big George Patterson, another of the veterans left with the rebuilt Amerks, tied the count with four minutes to go on Red Conn's assist. 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Island Rugby Title Retained By Saints

Red And White Team Capture 3rd Successive Football Crown On Snow-covered Field.
The St. Dunstan's University football squad won the senior championship of the Province for the third successive year by virtue of a 13 to 3 victory over the Prince of Wales College fifteen in a hard fought rugby battle Saturday afternoon. The game was played at Victoria Park on a snow covered field, on which cleats were of little benefit. Under the peculiar conditions both teams resorted to the only feasible style of play, that of dribbling and kicking. At times the game resembled a soccer match, but the merits of the dribbling game for gaining territory were proved in no uncertain manner. Another feature, noticeable particularly in the first half, was that both teams kicked to the open field in Caledonia style, rather than for touch. As a result there were fewer "line-outs," and a much faster game, with frequent kicking duels between fullbacks and three-quarter lines. For the Saints, MacDonald, who scored two of the winners' three tries, Arsenault, who scored the third, and O'Connor, the heady and hard kicking full back, were outstanding. The whole team, however, played with almost perfect co-ordination throughout. The Red and White forwards followed the ball relentlessly. In defeat the Prince of Wales boys who entered senior ranks this year, have nothing for which to reproach themselves, as the game was much closer than the score would indicate. The red and blue rugbists never stopped trying, and, until the final whistle sounded, were constant scoring threats. Fitzgerald proved his ability to kick from any angle, and his toe frequently was accountable for substantial gains for his team. Simpson, and Saunders as full back also kicked well. Outstanding among the forwards was Tom Johnson, who never ceased to follow the ball, and proved himself an adept dribbler. Walsh, who scored P. W. C.'s lone tally, also gave a good account of himself.

First Half
St. Dunstan's kicked off for the first half, and the Red and White forwards swarmed up the snow-covered field in pursuit of the oval, but the ball was returned. For some minutes the play zig-zagged over the centre line, but on a long dribble the Saints worked into scoring position. Several well timed kicks brought the game back to centre field, and soon the Saints in their turn were on the defensive. Quickly the play switched from one end of the field to the other, as forwards followed kicks and gained territory by dribbling. For the greater part of the half the Prince of Wales scrum controlled the ball, and Fitzgerald lost few opportunities to kick. The Prince of Wales score came after fifteen minutes of play. Following a scrum near centre field, Owen snapped up a loose ball, tossed Walsh a long looping pass, and the latter ducked and dodged thirty five yards for a try. The attempt at convert failed. For the remainder of the half St. Dunstan's had a visible edge on territory, but Prince of Wales by timely kicking brought the play into the safety zone time after time. The Saints followed a systematic plan of attack—kicking and dribbling to within scoring position, and then resorting to a fast back field passing attack in an endeavour to score. A few minutes before the half closed the system netted them their first try, "Fiddler" MacDonald doing the trick by a plunge near the corner. Gillis added the extra two points from a very difficult angle. Second Half
In the second half both teams tried strenuously to score, following practically the same tactics as in the first half. The Saints' scrum heeled the ball from the majority of the scrummages, and made frequent invasions of P. W. C. territory. Several times Prince of Wales worked into scoring position, but their attempts came to naught. The scene of play shifted quickly from one quarter of the field to the other. The second St. Dunstan's try came about the middle of the half, following a dribble from near centre field. MacDonald was again the man to score, pouncing on the pig skin which he followed over the line. The try was unconverted. For the remainder of the half Prince of Wales was on the defensive most of the time despite their desperate efforts to count. The Saints' third try was scored on a beautiful piece of backfield work, a few minutes before the close of the game.
