LONDON, July 29.—David Lloyd George, Great Britain's war time premier, was reported today to be holding his own, after an operation for kidney ailment, although the outcome was not considered at all certain because of the age of the veteran statesman. An official statement issued at 8 p.m. said: "So far Mr. Lloyd George's condition continues satisfactory," the words "so far" were interpreted by some observers to mean that the attending physicians apparently were conservatively qualifying their statement. The operation was an emergency one. The former premier was attended by the king's own physician Lord Dawson of Penn, and others of the most famous surgeons in England. They pronounced the operation successful.

Quebec Elections On August 24th

MONTREAL, Que., July 29.—The Provincial elections in Quebec will take place on August 24, according to a special dispatch from Quebec appearing in La Presse here today. The newspaper says that announcement of the dissolution of the present Legislature will be made tomorrow. The dispatch also stated that Hon. Gordon Scott, Minister without portfolio, will resign from the Legislative Council, to stand as candidate for the Legislative Assembly, in St. George division, Montreal. Announcement that Gerard Tremblay will be appointed Minister of Labor, a new portfolio, and that W. F. Bullock, M. L. A. for Sheffield, will be elevated to the Legislative Council is also made in the dispatch.

Tramps Trek To Saint John

SAINT JOHN, N. E., July 29.—Vagabonds, that paradox-land of nowhere in particular yet everywhere in general has more of its vague citizenship drifting about the streets of Saint John at present than perhaps in any period since the city was destroyed by fire 54 years ago. They came in on every freight train, railwaymen say, and automobiles report an uncommon number of hitchhikers bound to St. John. Sheltered places along the highways bear littered or ashy traces of these itinerant campers.

The lure, of course, is a widespread report that Saint John has been half ruined by fire and is to be speedily rebuilt. The day after the Sand Point blaze one Upper Canadian paper carried the sub-line in its heading "50,000 Men Will Be Required at Once For Speedy Reconstruction." Every moving picture weekly has pictured the West Saint John blaze and screen announcements have predicted early restoration activities.

So it is only a natural sequence that all roads should lead to Saint John, imagined oasis in a desert of unemployment. Newspapers have already told what measures have been taken to prevent perennial hikers from stealing work from St. John's own unemployed, but a railwayman told The Evening Times Globe no measures can be too strictly enforced or too many barriers set up to prevent diversion from the pockets of the taxpaying local workers any of the wages sure to be distributed in West Saint John between now and Christmas.

To become a hobo centre suddenly is a novel experience for this generation. Saint John has had big influxes of strangers on special occasions of a holiday or celebration character, not to mention the summer rush of tourists but to become Mecca for the tramps of more than half a continent has introduced interesting sidelights to students of human nature and the person with a sense of humor. Mate Advances as Turf Money Winner

By his victories in the Preakness, the American Derby and the Arlington Classic, Mate has advanced to ninth place among the leading money winners of all time on the American turf.

Mate's smashing triumph in the Arlington Classic, richest race in the world this year for three-year-olds, brought his owner, A. C. Bostwick, New York millionaire, the sum of \$73,650. Thus far Mate's winnings as a three-year-old total \$173,675, placing him next to Zev and Gallant Fox as the greatest three-year-old money winner in history. As a two-year-old Mate won \$58,650.

Gallant Fox, last year's three-year-old champion, won \$336,275 in 1930 and Zev rolled up \$272,008 in 1923. Despite the fact that he won 11 straight races Man O' War won only \$166,140 in his three-year-old year.

ROYAL MONTREAL Prepares For Canadian Classics

MONTREAL, Que., July 30.—An historic club, a stiff championship course and a luxurious clubhouse—these are the highlights of the Royal Montreal Golf Club, venue of the Canadian amateur golf championships which take place over the Dixie links from August 10 to 15. Founded in 1873 and held to be the oldest organized golf club on the continent, Royal Montreal has seen many a hectic championship struggle waged over its well-trapped fairways, and if the entries received thus far for the Canadian classic are indicative of the class of competition, the crown now worn of C. Ross Somerville of the London Hunt Club will be well and truly won by the evening of August 15.

The Royal Montreal course is also the venue of the Inter-provincial championships which will be played by teams of four from each province on August 7 and 8.

The club boasts of two 18-hole courses, and it is over the south course that the championship will take place. Under the supervision of a succession of alert executives and the club professional, Charlie Murray, twice open champion of Canada, the south course has been developed into one ambitious proportions. The length is 6,525 yards and the par 72. It is now in splendid shape and with an ordinary amount of rainfall by August 10, it should be finely conditioned for the championships. The layout is as varied as one could wish for. Long hitters will find holes to suit them perfectly, and accurate iron players will feel equally comfortable. But with a highway on one side, a system of creeks and a railway track plunging through the centre, a premium is put on accuracy. Experts predict precious few par rounds during the championship.

The championship headquarters will be the luxurious clubhouse, comparatively recently built. Constructed on the lines of huge hotel, the clubhouse which is said to have cost in the vicinity of a million dollars will give competitors and spectators every conceivable comfort and accommodation.

A short description of the course, hole by hole, follows:

Hole no. 1, 495 yards, par 5: A fairly easy start. The fairway is wide and the green rather open. A good opportunity to start with a birdie for the long hitter.

Hole no. 2, 295 yards, par 4: The preferred area on this hole is reached by hooking the ball slightly around the bend to the green. A well trapped green and a nearby boundary supply the difficulties here.

Hole no. 3, 170 yards, par 3: A difficult iron shot uphill to the green, which is jealously protected by traps.

Hole no. 4, 360 yards, par 4: The fairway presents some difficulties, and the green is reached by a shot over a deep moat. Back of the green is the railway track, which makes the second shot the hard one for the par seker.

Hole no. 5, 335 yards, par 4: The accurate player will shine here. The fairway and green are well trapped, which makes for lots of trouble for the player who tries for a birdie on this one.

Hole no. 6, 445 yards, par 4: Traps on the left, a creek on the right, and a creek between tee and green make this one of the most difficult par four's on the course. An accu-
