OTTAWA STAR HAS FINE CAGE RECORD

OTTAWA, May 18.—(By Canadian Press)—Basketballers, take a crack at this record.

In 10 years competition in league and playoff games Leo McCaffrey, 29-year old Ottawa star, has scored an average of 11.6 points for 133 games, a length of play and scoring punch record probably unequalled in the Dominion.

When Montreal Fusiliers eliminated Ottawa Britannias in a recent Dominion senior playdown series, McCaffrey saw his ambition of playing on a Dominion Championship team again fade. But it was through no fault of his. Proving himself the best forward in the series, he scored 29 points in two games, a record for Ottawa-Montreal series games.

McCaffrey also holds the record for Montreal-Ottawa playoffs for 13 years in all classes with 23 points scored in an intermediate playoff game in 1926. For the past two years he has led the senior city league in scoring and while an intermediate led the local circuit for three years—another record.

Volunteering to save the Ottawa and district basketball league two years ago when it was on its last legs, McCaffrey has been mainly responsible for restoring the popularity of the game in the Capital and has proved himself as able an executive as he is a player. This

past season he was president of the league and manager and coach of the Britannia team as well as its star forward.

Two years ago McCaffrey coached Ottawa Britannia juniors to a Dominion championship and, improving with age, may yet realize his ambition to play on a national championship outfit.

PAYROLL SWINDLE IS UNCOVERED AND ONE ARRESTED

MONTREAL, May 18.—A cheque swindle that may involve several thousand dollars has been detected here and one man has already been arrested. Excellent imitation of Canadian National Railway pay cheques have been honored by several banks within the last day or so, it was learned. The cheques were drawn on the Bank of Toronto, but none were cashed by that institution.

E. G. Delow, C. N. R. paymaster at Montreal, admitted over long distance telephone that forgers have been duplicating Canadian National pay cheques, but declared he could not give the exact amount which had been defrauded.

"No special department was affected. The forgers just duplicated our pay cheque forms," Mr. Delow stated. "Did the forgers get more or less than \$30,000?" The Star asked. "I couldn't say. The whole

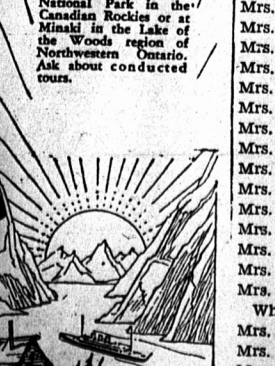

Brigantine Is Scuttled Off Grand Banks

(Canadian Press) ST. PIERRE, Mo., May 18.—Loss of the French brigantine Gloire A. Dieu on the Grand Banks was described today by her skipper, Captain Charles, and by Captain Beere of the tern schooner Gladiateur, of Bordeaux, which rescued the brigantine's crew. On May 12, Captain Beere said two men in a dory from the Gloire A. Dieu came to him and reported that their vessel was leaking badly. Captain Beere returned with the two seamen and after discussing the situation with Captain Charles they decided the Gloire A. Dieu should be abandoned. The brigantine was fired and scuttled and another of the vanishing square riggers disappeared from the face of the sea in a cloud of smoke and steam. The Gloire A. Dieu was owned in St. Malo, France. Both she and the Gladiateur were members of the French fishing fleet which for centuries has annually visited the Grand Banks. The latter had 800 quintals of fish aboard when she arrived here with the rescued crew.

Fast Work

(Canadian Press) BREMEN, Germany, May 18.—The North German Lloyd Line announced today the successful transmission by wireless from Zurich, Switzerland, to the S. S. Bremen of a picture in the form of an engraving.

The receiving apparatus on the vessel, now en route to New York, transformed the picture into a cut ready for printing. The process, known as radiotype, represents several decades of scientific research by Adalbert Guth, director of the Swiss Radiotype Company.
