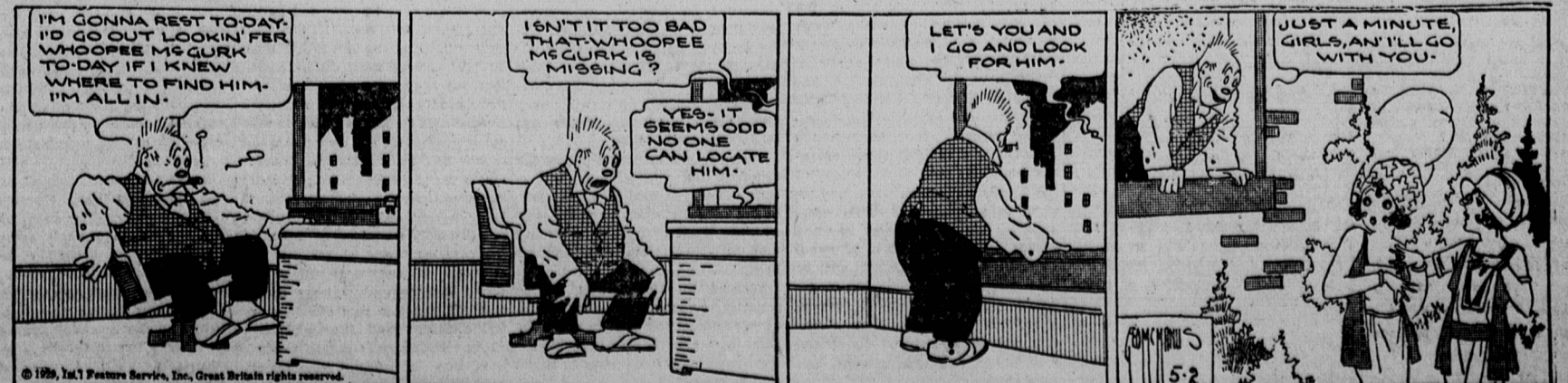
Jewellery in the bag included a gold half-hunter, three diamond rings, and two antique bangles. The contents were estimated to be worth more than \$3000.
