WESTCHESTER STRIKE ENDS PEACEFULLY

MAMARONECK, N. Y., April (Special).—Through the efforts of the State Board of Mediation representatives of 2,500 laborers on a strike along the north shore of the Sound had a conference with contractors today which ended in a settlement. The meeting was held in the Town Hall here.

Scattered about the hall were armed officers to prevent any outbreak, but at the close of the conference strike leaders and contractors were shaking hands and having a jolly time together.

"These men cannot live on \$1.50 or \$1.60 a day," said a union leader. "Besides they have padrone system in Mamaroneck and the men are forced to pay \$2 before they can get a job."

The settlement was a victory for the strikers, as well as the contractors. The contractors were not forced to sign any agreement to employ only union men, while the strikers received an increase, so that the minimum wage shall be twenty-two cents an hour, a work day of not more than nine hours, preference for local labor, abolition of the padrone system and weekly pay days.

Relative to his consultation with Dr. Friedmann, Surgeon General Blue said:

"Dr. Friedmann consulted me with regard to the steps necessary for him to take to obtain a license for the sale of his product. I explained that until the exact nature of the remedy and the method of its preparation had been substantiated by official tests and investigations a license for its sale in interstate commerce could not be issued."

"Dr. Friedmann said that several of the cases he had treated in New York were in the third stage of tuberculosis and he did not consider them the best type of cases to demonstrate the efficiency of his remedy. He said that cases in the first stages respond readily to his treatment."

"The money is of minor importance," he said, "When I think of the poor persons, the mothers and children from their knees, begging for relief from what you call the 'great white plague' I want to hurry the experiments and tests all the more."

WASHINGTON, April 16 (Special).—Dr. P. Friedmann, of Berlin, has consulted Surgeon General Blue, of the Public Health Service, relative to obtaining a license for the sale of his turtle serum, which he asserts is a cure for tuberculosis.

Dr. Friedmann announced he would hold a clinic at the George Washington University Hospital, where he is expected to treat upwards of forty cases.

Thus may the glory be spread abroad and these our words be echoed far and wide, that those in distant lands who hear may rejoice, our neighbors on every side give us praise, and may the new life of the old nation be lasting and unending. Who of us can dare to be neglectful of his duties?"
