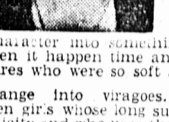

## THE COOK'S CORNER

SPICE CAKE One half cup shortening, 1-2 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1-2 teaspoon each of cloves and nutmeg and salt, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 2-1/2 cups flour, 3-4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup sour milk, 1-2 teaspoon baking soda. Cream shortening and sugar together until light. Add eggs, one at a time and beat well. Add vanilla and spices. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together, and add alternately to the egg mixture with the sour milk, into which the baking soda has been stirred. Beat until smooth. Bake in greased and floured loaf cake pan at 350 degrees about 45 minutes, or until it springs back lightly from touch in centre.

OAT MACARONS One-half cup butter 1 cup sugar 2 eggs 2 teaspoons vanilla, 1 cup sifted flour 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 to 1-2 cups rolled oats. Cream the butter, add sugar gradually and cream together until very light. Beat eggs, add to first mixture, then add vanilla. Add salt and baking powder to flour and sift together. Add flour to the mixture. Add 2 cups oats and drop the batter from a tea-spoon one inch apart on a well-greased pan. Bake one cookie first. If it spreads too much, add remaining oats. Sprinkle chopped nuts or coconut on each cookie. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit) 12 to 15 minutes.

Making of Lovely Rugs Shown in New Booklet

Hooked Rug One of Many Kinds Nothing is more charming or more beautiful than a hooked rug. And the oval one in our picture is so gay with its wreath of flowers, its bright blue centre.

You make it easily from cast-off clothing, left-over materials out in strips 1-3 to 1/2 inch wide. The hooking is simple, as our diagram shows. With one hand you hold a strip under the burlap foundation for your rug and with the other hand insert hook through burlap to pull up strip, making a loop on surface about 1/4 inch high. To prepare burlap for hooking just cut a paper oval the exact size of rug—27 or 38 inches—and lay it on the burlap, pencil around it. Then cut a smaller paper oval (11 by 22 inches) centre it within your larger oval outline and pencil around it also. Draw flowers between the two outlines and ink in all lines.

Next step is to stitch carpet binding around larger oval, tack edges of burlap to a simple wood frame, as your flowers "bloom".
