PREPARING FOR THE PRINCE.—The Charlottetown Railway Station is being handsomely decorated for the coming visit of the Prince of Wales. The front of the station will have three large signs, the uppermost one the length of the building containing the words: "God Bless our King and Queen." Beneath this will be an electric sign with the wording "Long Live the Prince of Wales." Three smaller signs with the words "God Bless our Queen," composed of electric lights will surmount an archway which is to be built at the front of the building. The whole building will be resplendent with electric lights and the portion facing the railway tracks will be handsomely festooned with red, white and blue and appropriate bunting. The work is being directed by Messrs. Herbert Vandervest and Preston McLean. Bert Strickland and Fred Harper are putting up the bunting and Mr. Robert Duncan is doing the woodwork.

Leather hats for women for motor wear, have been shown by the milliners for some time, but now models are seen that are specially adapted to street wear. One natty hat of this type is made of dull, black leather, trimmed with a black leather quill, faced with bright orange.

The loving loyalty of the lacemakers of Belgium to King Albert and Queen Elizabeth has found expression in the making of a lace scarf to be offered in homage to their queen. The work has been done in secret and piecemeal. The design for the scarf is a collaboration of the most famous artists of Belgium, and consists of five principal medallions, representing the chief feminine industries of the country, surrounded by wreaths of roses and foliage and trails of ivy leaves. Twelve thousand hours of work were spent on it, and it is said to consist of about twelve million stitches. But still it weighs less than five ounces! A remarkable feature of the work is the use of shadings to make the draperies on the figures more realistic. The perspective in the small scenes is irreproachable and even the faces have expression. In contrast to the lace trimmed, summery blouses, are a number of fur-trimmed models. The fur outlines neck or collar, and cuffs, and is used in such a way as to be not too heavy in appearance.

The following interesting sketch of Rev. Dr. John Pringle, the famous P. E. Island soldier and preacher, appears in a Montreal exchange this week: In the widest use of the term the Rev. Dr. John Pringle is a member of the Church militant. For more than a third of a century he has been fighting the good fight from pulpit and platform, and when the war was on he went overseas to succor, cheer and comfort Canadians fighting the Huns. In addition to his academic degrees he now holds the military rank of Lieut.-Colonel. He is also a member of the Canadian Presbyterian Moderator of the Murray Harbor South, P.E.I., is his birthplace, and as a scholar he is a son of Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, and Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., from which he graduated in 1875. He has filled several pastorates in Ontario, Manitoba, and Nova Scotia, but his largest and most difficult charge was that of missionary to the Klondyke. He became a power in the gold fields during their early days when law and order were not so well established as they now are; and that affairs took the right turn was in large measure due to his preaching, and other public speaking to his example, and to the active assistance he gave to the work of government reform in the administration. Later he was chosen superintendent of the Presbyterian Church in Western Canada, and in the discharge of his duties he tramped on snow shoes more than one thousand miles in the Northwest Territories. Dr. Pringle is now pastor of the Presbyterian church, Sydney, Cape Breton.
