PLANT FOR NAME: CORRECTIONS

In the notes on the High Bush Cranberry, viburnum opulus (answer to C. M. Kings Co., Sept. 19th) one or two errors appear which require correction. It was stated that "the flowers in the centre of the cluster are small, bell-shaped, radiant and neuter." This should read: "The flowers in the centre are small, bell-shaped and perfect; those on the outside of the cluster are larger, radiant and neuter, that is, they never produce berries."

POULTRY NOTES

The poultryman is busy these days. There is the hen-house to get ready for the long winter, during which the hens will necessarily be confined to its shelter. The house should first of all be freed of vermin. The floor should be attended to, next and perhaps the easiest way to do this is to clean it thoroughly and bed it with broken stone, well levelled. A carload or two of dry earth on top of this will make a nice clay floor. Concrete floors have proved too cold and damp for this district. There is, I notice, a tendency to revert to a house of a somewhat warmer type, and this undoubtedly will have a good effect on winter egg production. Plenty of light is essential to the health of the poultry; have plenty of glass, see that it is well cleaned, and arrange for curtains or screens at night.

Roots for Seed Raising

Many farmers raise their own root seed; turnip, sugar beet, and the like. In saving the roots—which should be ideal in appearance and condition—care must be taken not to trim the leaves too close; leave a portion of the leaf-stalk about a couple of inches long, so that the growing point is uninjured. It is almost certain that some of the roots will decay in the cellar during the winter; so that more must be reserved than are actually needed. Roots often decay from unsuspected injuries in handling, and as decay spreads from root to root, it is vital that the unsound roots should be removed. Pick over the batch from time to time. The temperature of the cellar, too, has an influence on the seed-roots; they must not be in the slightest degree frozen, and on the other hand if the cellar is too warm they commence to grow, with consequent loss of substance which should go to form the seed.

Livestock Market

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 1.—(Livestock)—There were 32 cattle, \$1 calves, 134 hogs and 622 sheep and lambs, for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. Common to plain cows brought \$3 to \$3.50, bonanza bulls were sold for \$3 to \$3.50. There were only 32 calves and prices were unchanged. Good ewes and wethers were steady at \$7.50 with culled and bucks at \$5.50. Sheep brought \$3 to \$4. Bacon and butchers were sold for \$12 fed and watered. Selects were paid \$1 premium per hog over backs. Sows were from \$9.50 to \$10.

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
