TORONTO, Aug. 25 (CP)—Both mining groups held minor index gains at the close of the Toronto exchange today. Trading vigor was far from robust and turnover for the day was only 140,000 shares.
 Duquesne traded 33,000 shares and firm 1-4 to 12 and Lapa Cadillac 15,000 shares on a gain of 1 1/2 to 11 1/4 cents. Anor, Broulan, Buffalo-Ankerie, Central Patricia, Francoeur and Sylvatica firmed moderately against minor losses for East Marlarie, Little Long Lac, Madsen, Pickle Crow, San Antonio and Toburn.
 Small gains were boarded for Waite-Amulet, Normetal and Steep Rock. Smelters weakened a minor fraction.
 Bathurst and Consolidated Paper 17 1/2 to 11 1/4 cents. In the food, Western Canada Flour pfd had a gain of 2 points to 24 and Westons was up 1-2 to 10 1-2. D-sh-

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Aug. 25 (CP)—On the Montreal livestock market, cattle receipts were 1,664; calf receipts 2,824; sheep receipts 3,653 and hog receipts 856.
 The market was uneven. Calves 25 to 50 cents lower and lambs 50 cents lower. Cattle and hogs were about steady. There were not enough cattle sold early to establish prices. Canners and cutters were \$3.50 to \$4.50 and butcher c.w. \$6.75 to \$7. A few steers ranged from \$5.50 to \$9.25. The bulk of the cattle including good steers were not sold at time of writing.
 Veal calves were steady, other kinds of calves were 25 to 50 cents lower. Trading was slow. Veal calves ranged from \$8.50 to \$12.50. Good quality made \$11.50 to \$12 with a few tops up to \$12.50. Medium kinds \$10.50 to \$11.50 and common kinds mostly \$9 to \$10. Drinkers were \$7 to \$8 and grassers \$5.50 to \$6.50, mostly \$5.75 to \$6. Lambs were .50 cents lower than last week. Good ewes and wethers moving slowly at \$11.50 to \$12. Several loads were delivered on former contracts at \$12. Buck lambs and culls were cut \$1 and \$2 per cwt. respectively. Sheep were \$3 to \$3.50 selling mostly between \$5 and 6.
 Hogs were about steady, selling mostly at \$14.75 for B-1 dressed, \$11 for B-1 alive fed and watered and up to \$12.25 off trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$7.50 to \$8.50, tops \$9 live weight.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25 (AP)—Wheat prices weakened momentarily today after announcement of Presidential veto of legislation to freeze government stocks, but, when selling failed to expand, dealers who had sold "short" began covering their positions and the market advanced 15 points to 95 in a small trade and Dominion Foundries had a small gain.
 Home Oil closed 3 cents down at 2.35 and small gains were held by Calgary and Edmonton and Davies.

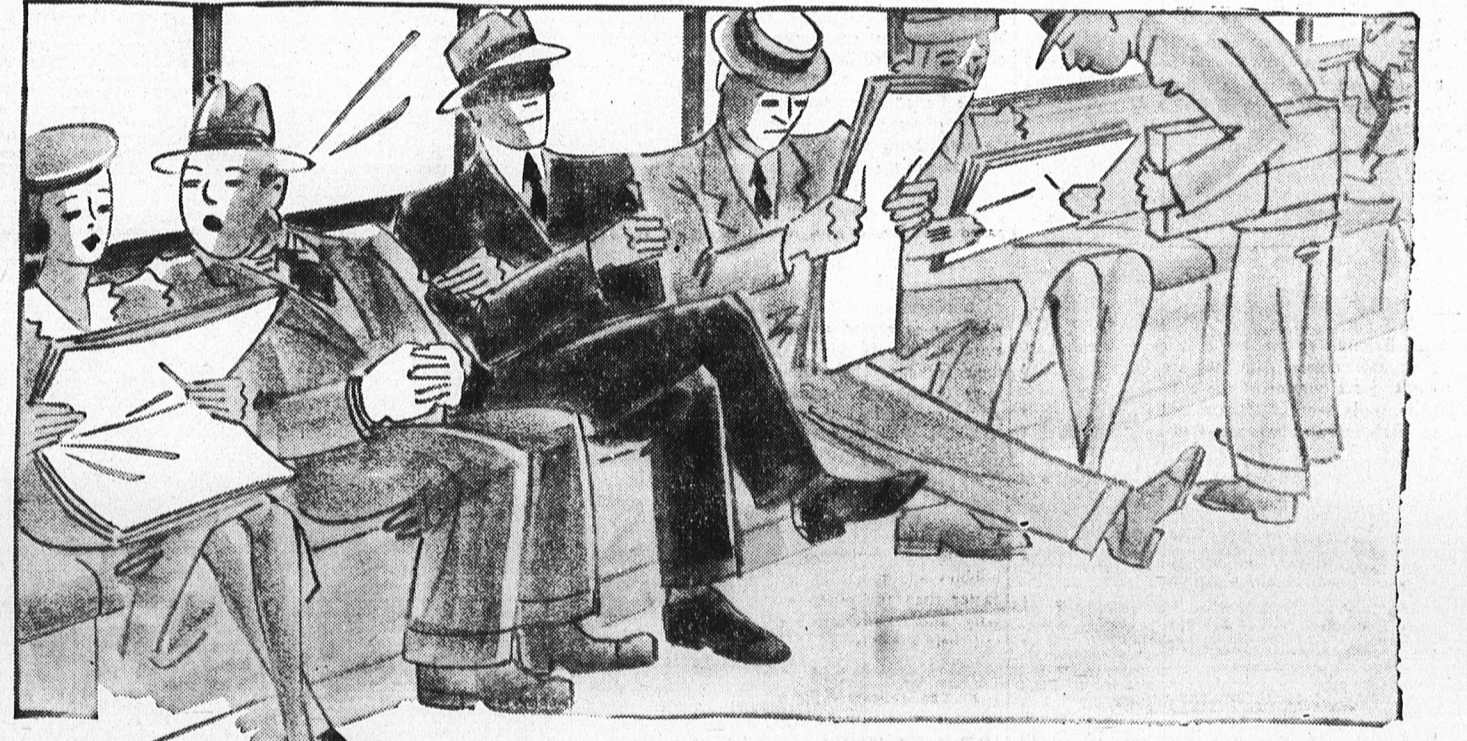
