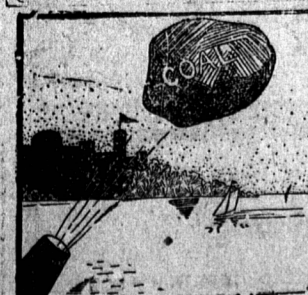

LARGE FUNERAL.—The funeral of the late Bernard McRoy took place yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock at St. Dunstan's Cathedral, thence to the cemetery. It was largely attended. The pall-bearers were Michael McCarey, Thos. Smith, Thos. Power, Patrick McKenna, James McAulay, and James McMurter. Rev. Maurice McDonald conducted the service at the church and grave.

HE WANTS TO KNOW.—"Shorty," from Charlottetown, P. E. Island writes to a Toronto Weekly periodical of wide repute and inquires if lots are worth \$375 each in "Victoria Park," Saskatoon. He is informed that "\$375 an acre" would be more like it. The following little suggestion is also appended to the reply: "Get a map of Saskatoon and trace out the location of your 'Park.'"

SOLICITOR GENERALSHIP.—The other day in the House of Commons, Ottawa, E. M. MacDonald, M. P., for Picton, asked if the office of Solicitor General for Canada was still vacant; if so, when the government intended to fill it, or if the government intended to abolish the office. The Prime Minister replied that the office was still vacant, that the appointment to the vacancy was under consideration, and also that the matter of abolishing the office had not been considered. This is the office towards which Prince Edward Island was fondly looking and in connection with which the name of A. A. McLean, K. C., M. P., was freely mentioned. It will be seen from the Prime Minister's reply that while there's a vacancy there's hope.

FISHERIES ADVISORY BOARD.—In the House of Commons, Ottawa, recently, Mr. Sinclair, M. P., for Guysboro, N. S., brought in a question regarding the steps taken by the Marine and Fisheries Department for the formation of a Fisheries Advisory Board. Hon. Mr. Hazen, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, stated that this Board will be formed and will be composed of persons representing the different branches of the fisheries industry and of certain departmental officials and that all the provinces except Ontario and the inland portions of Quebec would be represented thereon. The Department evidently is not cognizant of any ill-conceived project with certain members, connected with certain members, of there will be thirteen members of the Board, one of whom will be from P. E. Island. The representatives will be chosen for their intimate knowledge of the branch of the industry they are to represent and the members will be named by the Minister and will hold office during the Minister's pleasure. They will be paid the sum of \$10 per day when attending the meetings of the Board or of its committees. No appointments have yet been made to this Board.

ROCKLIFF RANGE.—P. E. Island fishermen will be interested in the reply to a question recently in the House of Commons, Ottawa, concerning Rockliff Range, where the representatives of the Garden of the Gulf have done themselves and their province so much credit in shooting and artillery competitions. The questions were put by Hon. Chas. Murphy, Liberal M. P. for Russell, Ont., and were answered by Col. the Hon. Sam. Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, who is so favorably regarded and remembered by the members of the 4th Regiment who had the pleasure of meeting him in Ottawa this year. It was stated that the first Government purchase of land for Rockliff Range was made in 1898, and additions to the original site were made by purchase in 1899, 1900, 1901, 1905 and 1906. The prices paid for different lots varied from \$75 to \$317.40 per acre, and the range occupies slightly over 443 acres. The total purchase price, including both cost of land and of expropriation was \$85,124.41. The buildings of all descriptions on the range number 30 and the cost of erection thereof was \$33,642.26. The range is connected with Ottawa by a branch of the Ottawa Electric Railway and towards the cost of extending this the Government contributed \$12,828.92. From the date of the original purchase of the land until Nov. 1, 1912, the Government has expended on the range for all purposes the sum of \$271,412.57.

PROGRESSIVE FARMERS.—There are 7,223 farmers in this province who are on the mailing list of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. The mailing lists include besides persons who apply to be put on, members of Parliament, members of the Senate, prominent officials of provincial departments of Agriculture, many boards of trade, public libraries and similar institutions. As a rule publications are sent to all persons whose names are on the lists of the branches by which they are issued. This rule is departed from in cases of publications of the experimental farms designed to give warning of the spread of noxious weeds and the introduction of dangerous plant diseases. Such publications are sent out not only to persons on the Experimental Farms mailing list, but also the public schools, post offices, railroad stations, cheese factories, creameries, and other places where farmers meet.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at the discretion of the Dominion Agency. Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to carry homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. Homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00. Deputy of the Minister of the Interior, N.
