"Although our activities have been unimpeded recently, nevertheless, we have been continuing our work as usual. The following is a resume of activities since the Annual Meeting on May 30th, we sponsored a picture in Yeo's Theatre. In June, when the weekly warehouse dances were resumed, the canteen was operated by members of the Auxillary, capably assisted by Mr. Ted Ellis, to whom the workers extend grateful thanks for his help. In August the tea party was held at which the W. A. took charge of the tables. We desire to express our sincere thanks to all who helped in any way for without this help the undertaking would never have been the success it was. In September the W. A. had a canteen at the Souris Exhibition. In addition to staples bought as required, two electric refrigerators, one on each floor, were purchased and installed in the hospital which proved a great convenience to the staff. The Aid also purchased rods to be attached to the ceiling from which curtains will be suspended to separate beds in wards and private rooms. These rods have not as yet been installed, but we hope to have the work done at an early date and the curtains completed. Purchases have been made from time to time, as they became available of articles such as floor coverings, tables, reading lamps, etc. in order to make the staff rooms more comfortable.

At a recent meeting of the W. A. the Hospital Board voted to be given the Hospital Board towards the cost of buying and setting up an elevator, which when installed, will greatly facilitate the work in the Hospital. Interest in and appreciation of the Hospital has been shown in the many donations of flowers, tables and other articles during the Summer. Particularly appreciated at the Hospital was the large amount of vegetables, etc., generously donated by the exhibitors at the Souris Exhibition. Monthly meetings are held regularly on the first Friday of the month at which visitors from the rural districts will be heartily welcomed.

Maritime Employment Picture Less Bright

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 7.—(CP) —The employment picture in the Maritime for the winter months, was not bright, W. M. Roberts, regional employment officer for the National Employment Service in the Maritime, told a meeting of the regional employment committee here. He estimated that when the harvesting and work in other seasonal occupations was completed there would be about 30,000 unemployed. Dr. Fletcher Peacock, President of the Maritime Unions, members were present from Saint John, Moncton, Halifax and Sydney. Mr. Roberts said that although the highest period for seasonal employment there are 15,000 out of work. Approximately 2,500 are seeking a similar number in the potato fields and in addition railway maintenance work, road work and construction work along with fishing, is slackening. General manufacturing during the last four months has not expanded. In fact, he said, it is reaching a point where every manufacturer is a layoff in some manufacturing plant because materials are not obtainable. The strike situation looks better but he felt that could not improve the general situation for quite a period of time, possibly six months.

Debert Army Camp To Be Demolished

OTTAWA, Oct. 7 — (CP) — A wartime army camp of 433 buildings and materials are to be demolished with usable materials salvaged, the Reconstruction Department announced Saturday. The demolition will follow the same pattern as projects at Transcona, Man., and Nobel, Ont., where buildings are being taken apart and materials salvaged. Materials suitable for the construction of homes, such as lumber, flooring, doors, windows, electrical and plumbing fixtures and wall-board will be allocated to contractors engaged in the construction of government-approved low-cost housing projects for veterans for the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

MANY WANT TO FLY ATLANTIC

LONDON, Oct. 5 — A "queue" of 12,000 persons has formed in the United Kingdom waiting for seats on U.S.-bound planes, it was learned today. Pan-American Airways reported that all their seats are booked until the end of February, while Canadian Overseas Airways have sold all available space in their planes through Jan. 21. The backlog is being worked off at a rate of 1,700 passengers a week.

Held For Hearing

GRAND FALLS, N. B., Oct. 6.—(CP) —The funeral of Miss Levesley Powers, 24, whose body was found in Ashburn Lake near Saint John last week, was held here Saturday from her parents' home. An Overstreet, 28, is awaiting preliminary hearing on a murder charge laid after an inquest into the young woman's death.
