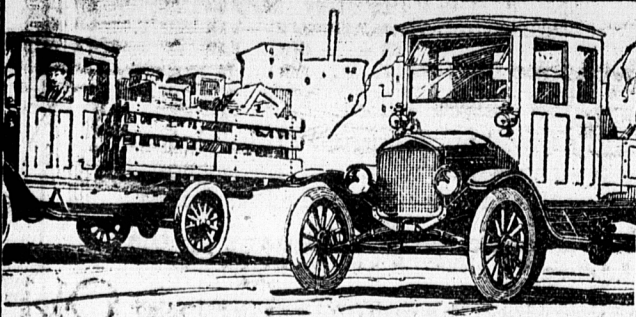

WELL KNOWN RESIDENT DEAD—The death took place at 7 o'clock Tuesday evening of Mr. Stanislaus M. Arseneault at the age of 67. Deceased had been in failing health for several years, and his demise was not unexpected. He leaves to mourn a large family of sons and daughters. The late Mr. Arseneault was a good Christian in the true sense of the word. Always of an irreproachable disposition, he was esteemed by all. During his illness he was often visited, by his pastor who ministered to his spiritual needs. And the morning before his death he again expressed a wish to be strengthened again in the holy sacraments of his church, so that at the close of the day which he had begun by receiving the Bread of Life, his soul took its flight to God. Reports of his funeral will appear later.

Belle River has sustained a distinct loss in the death of Mrs. Donald A. Stewart (nee Christine Martin), who passed away Good Friday, April 18, at the age of 70 years, after an illness of many months, which she endured with Christian patience. She had been a consistent member of the Wood Islands Presbyterian church for over fifty years, and her life was an exemplification of Christian virtue and grace, her motherly kindness, love and sympathy were extended to all.

Her friends were many, and the large concourse that followed her remains to its resting place in Wood Islands cemetery, shows the esteem in which she was held. The services at the house and grave were conducted by her pastor, Rev. J. C. Martin. Her husband, Donald A. Stewart, three daughters, Mrs. John Martin, Vancouver; Mrs. P. McKenzie, Edmonton and Miss Mary at home; three sons, Allen D., and Alex. at home, and Dan, of Edmonton, are left to mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother.

Dan and wife arrived from Edmonton some days before the mother's death, and was a source of great comfort to her.

Wood Islands has suffered a distinct loss in the death of Mr. John G. McLeod, Elder on Easter Sabbath evening, April 20th. Although 82 years of age he had been in good health and was out during the early part of the week attending to his usual duties.

The funeral on Tuesday 22nd was largely attended, the pall bearers being Angus McLean, Wm. M. Crawford, Alex. D. Stewart, John A. Gillis, Norman C. Stewart, Elders and A. W. McLaren. The services both at the house and grave were conducted by his pastor Rev. J. C. Martin. Interment at Wood Island's cemetery.

The Easter term of the Supreme Court opened in Charlottetown yesterday, the three Judges on the Bench. Judgement was delivered in the following cases:

Hogan trustee vs. Mary Morgan—action for ejectment. Application was made by defendant for non suit. Granted. Gaudet, K. C., for plaintiff, Martin, K. C. for defendant.

Jillis vs. MacAusland. Action for slander and malicious prosecution. Previously tried before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and a jury. Verdict was given for plaintiff for \$1500. Application was made to set aside the verdict and grant a new trial. Refused. Bentley K. C., Johnston, K. C., for plaintiff. Saunders, K. C., for defendant.

Ahearn vs. Doyle. Action of trespass. Tried before the Chief Justice without a jury. A verdict was given the plaintiff for \$36. Application for nonsuit was refused. Saunders, K. C., for plaintiff. Johnston, K. C. for defendant.

P. B. McCurdy and Coy. vs. R. B. Jenkins. Tried before the Chief Justice.
