FIELD-CRAFT
 Ways of Finding North (continued)
 3—The Watch Method—
 This method holds in the Northern Hemisphere and according to Standard Time. Point the hour hand at the sun. Bisect the angle between the hour hand and the figure 12. The line thus obtained indicates the north and south direction so that a person can tell by looking at the sun which is north and which is south.

4—Finding the Pole Star—
 By night, an almost exact method to locate the North or Pole Star. Everyone should be able to recognize the Big Dipper, variously known as the Plough or the "Great Bear." This is a constellation composed of seven prominent stars, three of these forming the handle, the "pointers" indicate the direction of the Pole Star, which seems to be distant about three and a half times the space between the "pointers."

The "Little Bear" may be seen inverted, in such a position that the last star of the handle is the Pole Star itself.
