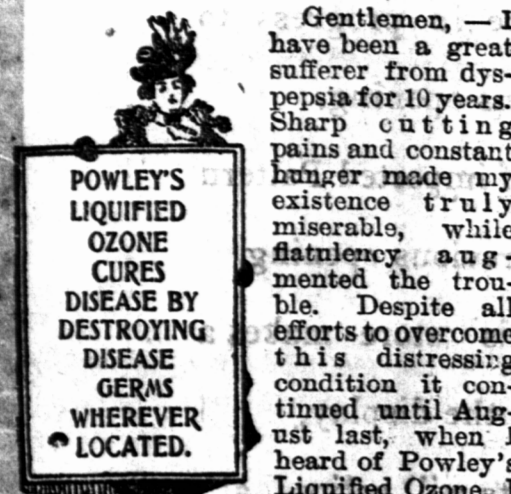

MRS. MAYBRICK'S RELEASE NEAR AT HAND

Story of the Life and Crime of the American Woman Who Poisoned Her Husband.

A great deal of interest has been aroused on two continents by the announcement, officially, of the fact that Mrs. Florence Maybrick, who has been imprisoned for 14 years on the charge of murder, is to be released on the birth of 1904.

The despatch bearing this interesting information was elicited from the London home office by the fact that there is a trial on in Virginia, West Virginia and Kentucky concerning the disposition of a large amount of real estate, in which Mrs. Maybrick has a prominent interest. The information concerning the coming release of Mrs. Maybrick was given out in order that the trial might be postponed until the close of her release.

This fact brings once more into prominence the woman whose incarceration in an English prison has caused more comment than the confinement of any other person. Friends on both sides of the Atlantic have done all in their power to have the woman released; jury and judge were charged with not knowing the business, and the public have come to the almost universal belief that Mrs. Maybrick is innocent of the crime for which she has already suffered 14 years imprisonment.

Indeed, the greatest argument that has been raised in the case is whether or not murder was committed, and evidence has gone to show that Mr. Maybrick was addicted to habits that in themselves would have caused him to die an unnatural death.

THE MAYBRICKS.

Mr. James Maybrick was a Liverpool man, and it is said his father was a parish clerk. Mr. Maybrick was a cotton merchant and spent at least half of his time in Virginia. Here he was subjected to attacks of malarial fever, and, it is claimed, not being able to take quinine, took up the arsenical habit, which caused his death. It is claimed that Mr. Maybrick obtained the drug without the customary prescription, and that he was in the habit of administering his own dose, and the friends of Mrs. Maybrick have always been of the opinion that he over-dosed himself at the time of his death, or that his system collapsed owing to its being permitted by the drug.

Mrs. Maybrick was the daughter of a banker of Mobile named Chandler. Her mother was the only daughter of Darius Blake Holbrook, who was associated with Cyrus W. Field in the laying out of the Atlantic cable. Mrs. Maybrick's father died during her infancy and her mother subsequently married Major Du Barry and after a second widowhood, married Mr. Maybrick. Her only brother died before the trial.

Mr. and Mrs. Maybrick were married in 1881 after a brief cohabitation on an Atlantic liner. Mr. Maybrick at that time was 42 and his bride 18. They went to Norfolk for three years, but as the climate did not agree with Mrs. Maybrick and their first-born they finally settled in Liverpool.

It was here that the second child was born and Mrs. Maybrick made the acquaintance of Dr. Bidder, with whom she later is alleged to have been intimate, and on whose account Mrs. Maybrick and her husband are said to have had more than one quarrel.

Shortly after this Mrs. Maybrick first began to complain of illness and Mr. Maybrick, in carrying out his wifely administration, with out knowledge of the nature of the powder, a goodly amount of arsenic.

THE TRIAL FOR MURDER.

On the 12th of June she was brought before the magistrates on the same charge. At 10 o'clock on her arraignment on Monday, the 31st of July, the Crown Court, situated in St. George's Hall, Liverpool, became the scene of the trial for murder of Florence Elizabeth Maybrick, age 26, no account, well educated, committed by Sir W. B. Fitzjones, W. Scott Barrer, Esq. and S. Beighouse, the coroner, for having at Kingston, on the 11th of May, 1892, feloniously, wilfully, and of her malice aforethought, killed and murdered one James Maybrick.

The presiding Judge was the Hon. Sir James Fitzjames Stephen. The counsel for the prosecution were Mr. J. A. Dimsdale, Q. C. M. P.; W. B. McConne, and Mr. Thomas Swift, instructed on behalf of the accused by Messrs. E. O. and J. S. W. The counsel for the defence were Sir Charles Russell, Q. C. M. P., and Mr. Pickford, instructed by Messrs. Cleaver, Hillen & Co.

The trial that followed it is one of the most famous in the annals of legal history. It was almost taken for granted on both sides that Mrs. Maybrick was guilty of murder, and her counsel did not go in for the arraignment with the error that ordinary charges are liable for the press. Masses of evidence accrued and from the maze of testimony the jury brought forth a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree, on the 7th of August. The date of execution was made the 27th.

AFTER THE TRIAL.

But the result of the trial did not satisfy the public conscience, and so much pressure was made on the Home Secretary that he finally had Mrs. Maybrick's sentence commuted to life imprisonment. The public was a great deal of time standing

ASKED FOR MORE TIME.

TORONTO, April 3.—Several distinct steps of progress were made at the organization meeting of the Gamey Commission today, but at the request of the prosecution, the commencement of the taking of evidence was deferred until a week from Monday next. At first Mr. Gamey's solicitors appeared ready to go on early next week, as Chancellor Boyd suggested, but on second thought they asked for an adjournment until the 13th inst.

SOUFRIERE'S LAST ERUPTION.

KINGSTON, St. Vincent, April 3.—The last eruption of the volcano Soufriere was the longest and, considered geologically, the most interesting. It lasted from March 11 until the morning of March 30. The volcano became again active on the night of March 30, when a startling phenomenon was witnessed, the crater appearing like an electric arc, being reflected upon the mountains of clouds. The Soufriere continues to show signs of disturbance.
