IN MEMORIAM

MR. DAVID MOLYNEAUX

One of the old settlers of Chicago Heights, David Molyneaux, died at St. James hospital last Saturday, of peritonitis. Mr. Molyneaux was 73 years of age, having been born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, Sept. 7, 1851. He came to the United States in 1878, settling in Cook county, where he has resided ever since. By trade he was a cabinet maker, and for the past sixteen years had been employed by the Calumet Steel company.

Satisfactory Operating of Canadian National Rys.

JASPER, Alta. Aug. 3—Commenting upon the financial statement of the Canadian National Railways for the six months period, January 1st. to June 30th, inclusive, issued this week, Sir Henry W. Thornton, Chairman and President of the Company, interviewed here today, said: "An analysis of the improvement in the cumulative position of the net earnings of the Canadian National Railways for the first six months of this year indicates that the result has been obtained through a substantial saving in operating costs. The gross receipts show a decrease of \$9,218,815.00 or 8.11 per cent, compared with the same period of last year, but the net revenue is \$1,129,916.00, ahead of the same period.

"To bring about this result, all forms of operating expenses have been substantially reduced; conducting transportation expenses showing a reduction of over five million dollars, or 9.12 per cent. This reduction in transportation expenses being in greater ratio than the decline in operating revenues indicates that the measures taken to increase operating efficiency are producing encouraging results, and in bringing about these results the property of the company has been maintained to a satisfactory standard, commensurate with the traffic handled.

"The increase in gross receipts shown during the weekly periods of July might be accepted as indicative that conditions have now shown a turn for the better."

MacMillan Held Fast In Arctic

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3—Locked in the Arctic ice, the MacMillan expedition is experiencing the dangers known to Polar explorers for centuries. The Melville Bay ice pack, which has stopped the progress of the ships Bowdoin and Peary, is playing its time-honored drama and endangering the expedition every minute. Commander MacMillan said today in a wireless despatch to the National Geographic Society.

The message was dated yesterday, and declared that, although the sky line of Cape York was in view, the ships were unable to move until conditions changed. Fog, ice, and magnetic variations, drifting pans and other troubles were mentioned as prevailing.
