Rival French Leaders Make Final Appeals

PARIS, April 28—(Canadian Press Cable)—Rival leaders in the general election campaign tonight made their final national appeals before France goes to the polls on Sunday.

Still suffering from laryngitis, which kept him from the five-power arms limitation conference at Geneva, Premier Andre Tardieu spoke from Belfort by proxy. From there—the Premier's constituency—his speech was read to the electors by Pierre Cathala, Under-Secretary of State, Edouard Herriot, leader of the Radical Socialists, spoke from Bourg.

"I feel reassured," ran Premier Tardieu's speech, "I see that Leon Blum, the Socialist leader, is claiming victory. I remember all the prophecies of the Socialist before. Prudence and modesty are not dominating virtues of Socialism, victory is in our hands if we can only reflect, and sacrifice the habit of buying the secondary preference to the essential."
