A letter was received from the publishers of the Canadian Home Journal and it was resolved that the letter be published as the best means of bringing the offer to the notice of the members of the L. W. C.

The Provincial Convention of Y. P. S. C. E. will be held in the Methodist Church at Centerville about the middle of July.

Mr. JOHN MCKENZIE came home yesterday evening from St. John for a few weeks visit to his parents Mr. and Mrs. Arch. McKenzie.

works are added in. He then compared the debt of Quebec, Nova Scotia, British Columbia which are much larger, Ontario has not got a debt as a province but the province, is divided into municipalities, and when they are aggregated the debts in the municipalities are very large.

In referring to the public accounts the Government had a surplus \$5,888.93. The bridge at Victoria is the finest on the Island. He challenged Mr. Campbell to repeat the statement that the steel bridge at Victoria had settled. On the day the Hon. Member made the charge he had telephoned and he found that there was no truth in the statement. The statement went through the press and needs contradiction.

Mr. Campbell said that he did not make the statement but asked the Leader of the Government if it was true!

Hon. Mr. Farquharson continuing read the opinion of four gentlemen living in Victoria, with regard to the condition of the bridge. With regard to the hawking of debentures he had never spent five cents in connection with the sale of debentures. They realised 3 1/2 per cent, so the credit of this Province was pretty good.

He then took up the different items of expenditure and went on to show that the claim made by the Opposition that \$42,000 was carried over from last year was not correct. A saving had been made in the Auditor's office, County Courts, schools, Administration of Justice, etc. During the reign of the late Government, more money was spent on the Provincial Building than anywhere else.

This Government spent \$310 less per year on the Provincial Building. One year \$4,000 was spent on it. Legislation has cost the present Government \$38,000 less for the past nine years as compared with the previous nine years under the late Government. With regard to the Insane Asylum the contract has been let and an annex is to be built. Debentures will have to be issued for the construction of it. Since the giving of the contract, the cottage system had been spoken of, but the contract had been let and nothing now could be done. Fire escapes had been ordered and 50 double windows had been placed. The Medical Superintendent had been replaced and Dr. Goodwill had introduced reforms which will be to his credit later on.

During the investigation part of the evidence showed that the Medical Superintendent only visited one hour per day and a great many days not the half of that. The Government demanded a four hour service and he spent nearly that time until his dismissal. Did the Government give the patients proper attention. Who is to judge? The Superintendent says he has no hesitation in saying that the patients are better cared for and more kindly treated than ever before. Any person who knows Mr. McPhail can estimate the worth of the statement. He then took up the expenditure in the Asylum per head which he claimed was less than under the late Government.

With regard to the Poor House he read a statement from Mr. Allan, the keeper, who stated that the food and clothing were equal to any previous year.

The schools are costing a great deal of money and he did not know how to save very much. Forty-seven per cent of the total revenue of the country is spent on schools. The young men who go abroad certainly give an account of the education they receive at home. He regretted that this province could not join in with the other provinces in a joint agricultural school.

When in Halifax he visited the School for the Blind and he was sorry that the grant from the province is so small. In Charlottetown a large number of children do not attend any school. He referred to a case existing in the city where a woman is compelled to leave a baby and a little boy alone and go out washing. The neighbors are unable to live in the other half of the house because of the crying of the baby when the mother is out. The Government had taken care of the children. In referring to the Prince Street, South Port, and Rocky Point, wharves he said that during the late Government's reign they spent as much as \$10,000 a year. Last year he Government only spent \$700. The present

Mrs. Neil McPhail, daughter of Capt. M. Murchison, North River, and children leave this morning for her home in California. Mrs. McPhail has been visiting her old home. Administration expects to follow on in the saving of money.

He then reviewed the estimated expenditure and showed where a saving had been effected. He said that Government are going to create a department of agriculture. Two extra vaults have been placed in the land office and the Registrar of Deeds will remove his office to the Provincial Building. A bridge is to be built across the Hillsboro. The contract was only signed a few weeks ago, as it was advisable to keep the contract open. Now the contract has been made. The parliament of this country had voted \$12,000 but the country will have the bridge for \$9,750 which will pay the interest on part of the money used to construct it.

Last year the exhibitors of this province captured \$4,000 in prizes and the provincial Government was in duty bound to hold a provincial exhibition, or the Island exhibitors would have been shut out.

It may be that the Government will introduce a prohibition bill and the money from liquor licenses may not be so much a few days will tell whether that will be so or not.

He then referred to the expenditure for public works and the debentures remaining unsold and challenged the Opposition to contradict the figures and statements quoted during the evening, claiming that the country will judge what is right and will do right by a Government that has done right by them.

Hon. Mr. Gordon had only spoken a few minutes when House adjourned to meet to-morrow at 10 o'clock.
