Woman Pleads Not Guilty To Murder Charge

AMHERST, N. S., June 22.—(By The Canadian Press)—Charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Philip Landry, former race-horse driver, Mrs. Francis Scoble of River Herbert pleaded not guilty today in Supreme Court before Mr. Justice W. L. Hall. Landry died on New Year's Day, from injuries alleged to have been received in the Scoble residence. Previous to his death he was found in a dazed condition, wandering about the streets of River Herbert. His skull was fractured.

Such an investigation might well be included in the work of any special committee on pensions which may shortly be appointed.

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Canada-Germany Treaty Within The Next Six Months

BERLIN, June 22.—(Canadian Press Cable)—An agreement between Germany and Canada to negotiate a commercial treaty within six months was announced by the German Government today.

'Quake And Tidal Wave Razes Town

MEXICO CITY, June 22. (A.P.)—An undetermined number of persons were killed early today at Cuyutlan, in the state of Colima, by an earthquake and tidal wave that destroyed the town, said messages from Guadalajara tonight.

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ENGLISH PAPERS COMMENT ON HOOVER PLAN

LONDON, June 23.—(Thursday)—President Hoover's plan (Associated Press) to cut armaments overtopped everything in London morning newspapers today, several editorials giving it a cordial welcome with the reservation, however, that it would need consideration.

Clause In Will Is Upheld By Appeal Court

TORONTO, June 22.—(By the Canadian Press)—The Ontario court of appeal has upheld the validity of a clause in the will of the late William Hallisey of Hamilton, Ont., providing for the establishment of a fund of \$2,000 for masses for the repose of the souls of the testator, his wife, son and daughter. The court based its judgment on an English decision, "that such bequests were not for superstitious uses and were therefore charitable."

Senator Dennis Sees Province Richly Blessed

A welcome visitor to Charlottetown today is Senator W. H. Dennis, of Halifax. Senator Dennis, who is accompanied by Mr. R. J. Rankin, managing editor of the Halifax Herald, and Mr. M. S. Clark, president of the Nova Scotia Trust Company, arrived last evening on a motoring trip and hopes to see a good deal of the summer attractions of the Province in the course of the next few days.

Blamed For The Deaths Of New Born Babies

RICHMOND, Que., June 22.—(By The Canadian Press)—The deaths of three new born babies were blamed upon Henry Charles Parry, 50, a farmer, at a coroner's inquest here today. Parry is held at the Athabasca County jail prior to arraignment on a murder charge on Monday morning. The children were born to his daughter, according to evidence.

CALLS FOR 1-3 REDUCTION IN ARMAMENTS

WASHINGTON, June 22. (A.P.) In an unheralded move toward international economic recovery, President Hoover today called for a one third reduction in world armaments. This, he said, would save the world \$10,000,000,000 to \$15,000,000,000 in the next decade. The possible saving to the United States was estimated at \$20,000,000,000.
