Maritime Member Interviews Mr. Hanna

TORONTO, June 8.—Hon. R. E. Finn, K. C., member of Premier Murray's Cabinet in Nova Scotia, had a conference yesterday afternoon with Mr. D. B. Hanna on matters affecting the Intercolonial railway and industries in the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Finn said in an interview last night that he had taken up with Mr. Hanna the issues that the representative delegation from the three Maritime Provinces had brought before Premier Meighen just before the Premier's departure for England, namely the freight rates on the Intercolonial and the proposal of that greater centralization of authority be granted Moncton, N.B., in handling railway affairs. "I am not in a position to discuss the result of my talk with Mr. Hanna," said Mr. Finn, adding however that it was in no complaining mood he approached Mr. Hanna and that the conference was of a most friendly character.

SIR SAM HUGHES HAS BEEN MOVED HOME TO LINDSAY

OTTAWA, Ont., June 8.—Sir Sam Hughes, who has been laying ill in Ottawa for some weeks, was moved to Lindsay today by special train provided by the Canadian National Railways. BELFAST, June 8.—Parliament in northern Ireland, elected last month under new home rule measure opened yesterday morning amid impressive scenes in the council chamber of the city hall here.
